- Proposal 132 During Commercial openings, incidentally caught Kings should be sold, because the subsistence users have already reached their personal quota, with the help of give aways, from the Commercial fisherman.
- Proposal 133 If we use smaller mesh, it will not be beneficial to the escapement of Kings, because they will get tangled, struggle, die, and fall off.

- Proposal 144 We've cut our nets too many times, and there is no reason to do so, due to the fact that Kings swim in deeper and cooler waters.
- Proposal 145 Same reason as Proposal 144.
- Proposal 146 Same reason as Proposal 133.
- Proposal 149 We've got the catch calendars already in place, so why create another?
- Proposal 152 By opening up that portion, ONLY those living in that particular area will benefit during FUTURE Commercial Fisheries, due to the fact that portion HAS the prime Quality of fish, before they enter the Yukon.
