Area Description

The Kalskag Controlled Use Area consists of that portion of Unit 18 bounded by a line from Lower Kalskag on the Kuskokwim River, northwesterly to Russian Mission on the Yukon River, then east along the north bank of the Yukon River to Tucker's Slough, then along the north bank of Tucker's Slough to its confluence with the Yukon River, then along the north bank of the Yukon River to the old site of Pamiut, then back to Lower Kalskag. The area is closed to the use of aircraft for hunting big game, including the transportation of big game hunters, their hunting gear, or parts of big game by aircraft between publicly owned airports.







Moose Harvest: Lower Yukon Area















Proposal 20: Unit 18 Ptarmigan Hunting

Summary

- Ptarmigan are abundant in Unit 18; however, no census or population information
- Late spring harvest occurs in coastal communities as ptarmigan arrive in response to delayed snow-melt in the coastal zone
- Male ptarmigan defend breeding territories on tundra by mid-May and are highly vulnerable to harvest
- Spring hunting is 'additive mortality' on birds surviving harsh winter conditions
- Protecting the breeding population after May 15 is recommended by the Department.

Incidental Take Regulations

<u>Current (Furbearers)</u>

5 AAC 92.095 Unlawful methods of taking furbearers; exceptions. (a) The following methods and means of taking furbearers under a trapping license are prohibited, in addition to prohibitions in 5 AAC 92.080:

(12) by placing or leaving an active trap or snare set on land that is within 300 feet of the site at which a moose, caribou, or deer was taken using a trap or snare; this prohibition applies for the duration of the regulatory year in which the moose, caribou, or deer was taken using the trap or snare;

- <u>LKAC Amendment</u>
- **5 AAC 92.095 Unlawful methods of taking furbearers; exceptions**. (a) The following methods and means of taking furbearers under a trapping license are prohibited, in addition to prohibitions in 5 AAC 92.080:

(12) by placing or leaving an active trap or snare [SET ON LAND THAT IS] within 300 feet of the site at which a moose, caribou, or deer was taken using a trap or snare; this prohibition applies for the duration of the regulatory year <u>, and may reset again</u> <u>in the same place or area during</u> <u>subsequent trapping seasons</u> in which the moose, caribou, or deer was taken using the trap or snare;

Methods and Possession

Current Regulation

•<u>5 AAC 92.140</u>

-(d) Notwithstanding (a) of this section, it is an affirmative defense to the crime of unlawful possession or transports of game, if the person who possesses and transports game or parts of game taken in violation of AS 16 or a regulation adopted under AS 16 is doing so for the sole purpose of salvaging that game or parts of game as required by 5 AAC 92.220, immediately salvages that game or parts of that game from the field and immediately surrenders that game or parts of the state located at the nearest office of the Department of

Fish and Game or Department of Public Safety.

LKAC Amendment

- <u>5 AAC 92.140</u>
 - (d) Notwithstanding (a) of this section, it is an affirmative defense to the crime of unlawful possession or transports of game, if the person who possesses and transports game or parts of game taken in violation of AS 16 or a regulation adopted under AS 16 is doing so for the sole purpose of salvaging that game or parts of game as required by 5 AAC 92.220, immediately salvages that game or parts of that game from the field and immediately surrenders that game or parts of the game to a representative of the state located at the nearest office of the Department of Fish and Game or Department of Public Safety; or it is an affirmative defense to the crime of unlawful taking of game if a trapper who incidentally catches game in a trap or snare reports the taking (harvest) to the nearest office of the Department of Fish and Game. The trapper who incidentally takes game should salvage the edible meat and surrender it to the state.


Proposal 18: Unit 18 Incidental Take By Trapping

<u>Summary</u>

- Statewide scope currently prohibits trapping after incidental take of moose, caribou, and deer
- Moose have expanded into Unit 18 causing 'first time' situations for many trappers
- Low rates of incidental catch in Unit 18; not a concern to moose population
- Salvage for 'illegally taken game' as required in 5 AAC 92.140 (d) is difficult for trappers due to:
 - Infrequent trap-checks
 - $\circ~$ Spoilage of meat from inside-out
 - Large frozen carcasses (moose, caribou)
 - Long travel distances









Incidental Take Regulations

<u>Current (Furbearers)</u>

5 AAC 92.095 Unlawful methods of taking furbearers; exceptions. (a) The following methods and means of taking furbearers under a trapping license are prohibited, in addition to prohibitions in 5 AAC 92.080:

••••

(12) by placing or leaving an active trap or snare set on land that is within 300 feet of the site at which a moose, caribou, or deer was taken using a trap or snare; this prohibition applies for the duration of the regulatory year in which the moose, caribou, or deer was taken using the trap or snare;

LKAC Amendment

5 AAC 92.095 Unlawful methods of taking furbearers; exceptions. (a) The following methods and means of taking furbearers under a trapping license are prohibited, in addition to prohibitions in 5 AAC 92.080:

(12) by placing or leaving an active trap or snare [SET ON LAND THAT IS] within 300 feet of the site at which a moose, caribou, or deer was taken using a trap or snare; this prohibition applies for the duration of the regulatory year <u>, and may reset again</u> <u>in the same place or area during</u> <u>subsequent trapping seasons</u> in which the moose, caribou, or deer was taken using the trap or snare;


-(d) Notwithstanding (a) of this section, it is an affirmative defense to the crime of unlawful possession or transports of game, if the person who possesses and transports game or parts of game taken in violation of AS 16 or a regulation adopted under AS 16 is doing so for the sole purpose of salvaging that game or parts of game as required by 5 AAC 92.220, immediately salvages that game or parts of that game from the field and immediately surrenders that game or parts of the state located at the nearest office of the Department of

Fish and Game or Department of Public Safety.

LKAC Amendment

- 5 AAC 92.140
 - (d) Notwithstanding (a) of this section, it is an affirmative defense to the crime of unlawful possession or transports of game, if the person who possesses and transports game or parts of game taken in violation of AS 16 or a regulation adopted under AS 16 is doing so for the sole purpose of salvaging that game or parts of game as required by 5 AAC 92.220, immediately salvages that game or parts of that game from the field and immediately surrenders that game or parts of the game to a representative of the state located at the nearest office of the Department of Fish and Game or Department of Public Safety; or it is an affirmative defense to the crime of unlawful taking of game if a trapper who incidentally catches game in a trap or snare reports the taking (harvest) to the nearest office of the Department of Fish and Game. The trapper who incidentally takes game should salvage the edible meat and surrender it to the state.


