


- 5800 square miles

1995 Southeast Brown Bear Committee

- <u>Members</u>: Board of Game, ADFG, US Forest Service, Guides, Dept. of Public Safety, Admiralty Bear Assoc., Territorial Sportsmen Visitors Assn., Tlinget-Haida Central Council, SE Guides Assn., and AK Visitors Assn.
- > Address 2 issues:
 - Regulate NR brown bear hunting to prevent overharvest
 - Regulate bear viewing to maintain high quality viewing
- Recommended a mortality rate of 3% to maintain harvest at the 1995 level
 - Concerns about habitat loss, uncertainty about bear population estimate, magnitude of unquantified wounding loss, and a desire to maintain harvest at the existing level which had been biologically sustainable



ADF&G's 1998 "white paper"

- Presented the history and research of brown bears in Unit 4
- Led to the framework that guided development of the Unit 4 Brown Bear Management Strategy

1998 – Brown Bears of Unit 4 – Past, Present and Future: A Status Report and Issues Paper

- Purpose was to identify issues and suggest remedial actions that:
 - Minimize effects of habitat loss from logging
 - Manage roads and human access
 - Conduct development projects/minimize effects
 - Manage solid waste
 - Regulate tourism/bear viewing
 - Regulate hunting/deal with proliferation of guides
 - Establish/maintain population and habitat monitoring program
 - Increase education promoting better human-bear coexistence
 - Continue bear research

BOG Direction, Involvement, and Ownership

- Over the last 2 decades, interest in hunting and viewing of brown bears in Southeast Alaska has increased, as has potential for conflict among user groups. At the request of the Alaska Board of Game a team of interested stakeholders, the Unit 4 Brown Bear Management Team, was assembled to develop comprehensive management recommendations in GMU 4. Recommendations made by this citizen and agency group included:
- Controlling the increase in the number of brown bear hunting guides that occurred over the past decade by limiting the number of guides and hunts they provide.
- Setting a total annual human-caused mortality cap of 4% for all bears and 1.5% for females on each island.
- Addressing the growing demand for bear viewing opportunities by managing viewing and hunting to minimize conflict

Recommendations of a citizens and agency brown bear management advisory team

June 2000

1998 – 2000 BBMT & BBMS

- Team composed of 15 individuals nominated by organizations representing various landowners/ resource agencies, special interest groups, the Board of Game, and other diverse entities
- At the request of the Alaska BOG the charge was to develop comprehensive manage-ment recommendations for brown bears in Unit 4

Guidelines

- Review issues of resource management and any human activities in Unit 4 that affect brown bears, such as hunting, viewing, human access, and habitat alteration;
- Agree on brown bear management goals and objectives;
- Determine what changes are needed in current management to meet those goals and objectives;
- Develop key elements of a management strategy that reflects those changes;
- Convey the strategy to the appropriate resource management agencies and regulatory boards with recommendations for their action; and
- Strive for consensus among interest groups.

BBMS - Goals

- Promote the long-term conservation and health of GMU 4 brown bears and their habitats
- Develop recommendations to provide for a broad spectrum of public enjoyment and uses, (hunting and nonhunting), of Unit 4 brown bears that is sustainable over the long-term
- Improve communication among the public and agencies involved in brown bear management

Issues

- Hunter harvest and other mortality levels
- > Guide use and allocation
- Roads and use by bears and humans
- Human activities and development
- Solid waste management
- Information and education strategies



Structure of the Report

Three (3) issues - 6 recommendations

BBMS recommendations included:

- Controlling the increase in the number of brown bear hunting guides in the unit by limiting the numbers of guides and hunts they provide
- Setting an annual human-caused mortality cap of 4% for all bears and 1.5% for females on each island
- Addressing the growing demand for bear viewing opportunities by managing viewing and hunting opportunities in a manner that minimizes conflicts

Implemented Recommendations

> BOG-related:

- BOG resolution 98-127, submitted to the state legislature on October 26, 1998, requesting that the Big Game Commercial Services Board or an equivalent be reinstated
- Adopted wounding loss provision in 2004 (Units 1-4) and amended it in 2006 to include Unit 5
- Reviewed Pack Creek and USFS Zoological cooperative work on Admiralty (bear hair snaring, visitor /viewing operation, etc.)
- Established a moratorium on new proposals to extend bear hunting in the Seymour Canal area of Admiralty Is.
- Reviewed BBMS progress in 2004
- Reviewed and maintained Closed and Controlled Use Areas in 2006

Implemented Recommendations

> Others:


- Monitored harvest and met guideline levels 7 of last 12 years
 - Issued EOs in fall 2011 to close islands when mortality guidelines were exceeded
 - Issued EO fall 2012 for Baranof Island
- Maintained communication and worked with stakeholders of the BBMS to meet its recommendations and anticipate developing issues
- Produced hunter ethics brochure
- Continued bear awareness education
- Provided bear education/safety for mine, hatcheries, and tourism staff
- Completed shoreline analysis EIS
- Completed Access Travel Management Plan
- Assessed sites for bear viewing development
- Completed NEC bear research

Recommendations Not Yet Implemented

- Guide numbers not reduced to 20
- Guideline numbers of hunts/GUA
- Next of kin guidelines
- No population estimate for south Admiralty Island


Current Issues

- Human-caused mortality exceeding 3 year average
- Registered guide numbers 28 instead of 20, as prescribed
- Number of hunts/GUA commonly exceed recommended numbers
- Hunt/harvest exceeds the anticipated 50% success
- Harvest of females high during fall seasons
- No population estimate for Baranof Island or South Admiralty Island, and other estimates are dated
- Increase in NOK (2nd degree kindred) hunts
- Wounding loss counted as human-caused mortality
- Private land NR hunts

BBMS Recommendations for addressing excessive human caused mortality

- Mandatory adjustment of number of guided hunters;
- Season adjustments;
- Institution of drawing permits for nonresidents on a GUA basis;
- Institution of drawing permits only after the above management alternatives have been employed.

Current Proposals before the Board

- > 32 Alternate spring/fall seasons for NRs
- 33 Change and shorten the fall season
- 34 Restrict bag limit based on harvest of female skull size
- 35 Modify harvest allocation above 4% level for residents
- > 36 Exclude wounding loss from counting as a mortality factor

Summary

- The BBMS continues to provide useful guidance and has the support of many interest groups;
- Some BBMS recommendations have not been implemented;
- BBMS guideline mortality is being exceeded;
- Public work session scheduled
