

Groundfish Fishery Management:

- Federal: Federal waters (EEZ; 3–200 nmi) guided by NPFMC process
- ▶ Parallel: State waters (0-3 nmi) concurrent with adjacent federal fishery and generally adopt federal regulations and management measures as guided by BOF process
- State-Waters (GHL): State waters (0–3 nmi) guided by BOF process


Central Gulf of Alaska Trawl Fisheries

- Management: Federal/parallel
- Participation: 50 to 60 vessels (CV/CP) \$
- Catcher-vessel size: 58-125 feet in length
- Total retained groundfish catch
 (2012): 268 million pounds
- Exvessel value (2012): \$52 million
- **Delivery location:** 97% of trawl catcher-vessel harvest delivered to Kodiak





Proposals

- Proposal 43: Create state-waters nonpelagic trawl fisheries for all groundfish species
- > Proposal 44: Create state-waters walleye pollock fisheries
- ➤ <u>Proposal 45</u>: Require 100% observer coverage for all trawl vessels fishing inside state waters
- Proposal 101: Close state waters in Alitak Bay to groundfish trawl and pot gear
- Proposal 102: Close state waters along westside of Kodiak Island to nonpelagic trawl gear
- Proposal 369: State-waters weathervane scallop management plan


Proposal 43 – Create state-waters nonpelagic trawl fisheries in the Cook Inlet, Kodiak, and Chignik management areas



Proposal 43 - Nonpelagic Trawl

Major Proposal Elements

- GHLs based on CGOA groundfish ABCs
- > Establish prohibited species catch (PSC) limits
- Require 100% observer coverage
- > Limit vessels to maximum of 58 feet in length



Proposal 43 – Groundfish GHLs

• Proposed GHL based on 25% of ALL CGOA groundfish ABCs (17 CGOA ABCs)

- ABCs include offshore/deepwater species
 - -sablefish, deepwater flatfish, rockfish
- ADF&G nearshore trawl survey (7 species)
 - Arrowtooth flounder, Pacific cod, flathead sole, yellowfin sole, rock sole, longnose skate, and big skate
 - 2013 ABCs = 532 million pounds
 - 25% GHL = 133 million pounds


Proposal 43 - PSC Limits

- Prohibited species catch (PSC) = bycatch
 - May not be retained or sold
- Establish PSC limits:
 - King and Tanner Crab
 - King Salmon
 - Halibut
- PSC limits undefined in proposal
- Federal/parallel groundfish fisheries
 - King and Tanner Crab: Total PSC not capped
 - King Salmon and Halibut: Total PSC capped


Proposal 43 - Observer Coverage

- 100% onboard observer coverage funded by vessel
- No State of Alaska groundfish observer program
 - Significant program development, funding, and coordination
- Federally permitted vessels subject to federal observer requirements during existing federal/parallel fisheries
 - -Full coverage (100%): Catcher-processers
 - Funded by vessel
 - -<u>Partial coverage (less than 100%)</u>: Most trawl and fixed gear catcher-vessels
 - Funded through fees on retained catch



Proposal 44 – State-waters pollock

Major Proposal Elements

- ➤ GHLs based on Area 620 and 630 pollock ABCs
- > Require 100% observer coverage
- > Limit vessels to maximum of 58 feet in length
- > Legal gear: pelagic trawl, nonpelagic trawl, seine, and jig

Pollock ABCs (2008-2012)


Area 620: 31-101 million pounds


Proposal 44 - Observer Coverage

- 100% onboard observer coverage funded by vessel
- No State of Alaska groundfish observer program
- Federally permitted trawl vessels subject to federal observer requirements during federal/parallel fisheries
- No proposed PSC caps (king salmon)
 - Observer program objectives



Proposal 45 - Require 100% observer coverage for all trawl vessels targeting groundfish inside state waters

- > Improve halibut, salmon, and Tanner crab bycatch estimation
- > Parallel trawl fisheries in the Kodiak, Chignik, and Cook Inlet areas
 - Most state waters <u>closed</u> to nonpelagic trawl gear
 - Most state waters open to pelagic trawl gear (pollock)
- ➤ No State of Alaska groundfish observer program
 - Program development, funding, and coordination





Proposal Considerations

- > State-waters trawl fishery considerations:
 - ABC allocation
 - Observer programs
 - Bycatch management
 - Endangered species considerations (SSL)
 - Closed waters
- ➤ NPFMC developing federal trawl bycatch management program
- > Require development and coordination

Proposal 101 – Close state waters in Alitak Bay to commercial and subsistence groundfish trawl and pot gear

- Companion to Proposal 338
- ➤ Promote king and Tanner crab population rebuilding by reducing bycatch
- ➤ Historically important walleye pollock fishing area for trawl vessels
- Established Pacific cod pot gear fishery
- Documented groundfish subsistence use
- Commercial and subsistence Tanner crab fisheries
- > Subsistence red king crab fishery
- Study needed to evaluate effects










Scallop Limited Entry History

- > 2001: Federal LLPs established (9 permits)
- ➤ 2002: Alaska legislature authorized creation of vessel-based limited entry program
- ➤ 2004: CFEC vessel-based limited permits issued with a three year sunset
- > 2008: Vessel-based limited entry sunset extended thru 2013
- > 2013: Vessel-based limited entry program expired
- > 2014: Open access fishery for scallops in state waters
 - Federal waters remain limited entry





Management Challenges

- Scallop beds managed as biological unit
- Unknown effort in state waters
- > Limited stock assessment

Proposed Management Plan

- Preseason registration (Apr 1)
- Manage state and federal waters separately within a bed
- Separate registration and reporting requirements
- Optional trip limits
- Require VMS in state waters
