a. Joint Board of Fish & Game Review:

<u>Chairman David Bill, Toksook Bay-</u> Summarizes results of the Joint Board of Fish & Game meeting in Anchorage October 12-16, 2013.

Stanley Anthony, Nightmute- (Comments scratched), Point of Order

<u>Chairman David Bill, Toksook Bay- (Translated by P. Samson)</u> Proposals that were adopted at the Joint Board of Fish & Game. Subsistence comments about creating Bethel a non-subsistence area.

Stanley Anthony, Nightmute- Window of subsistence closure for the general populations, if they close the area for subsistence it would be devastation for coastal villages for YK Delta. The areas of the YK Delta area of the two rivers rely on subsistence.

<u>John Phillip, Sr., Kongiganak</u> – Subsistence is our way of life... back in the day people from upriver would exchange with us for food that we didn't have. People would barter food from Nunivak, Toksook Bay, Kuskokwim areas, I want to see that begin continued. We don't want USFWS/ ADFG to ... (Example being used: Mouse Food Gathering). The non-subsistence use areas should just be tied to one area.

<u>Chairman David Bill-</u> Review of how we live and how we take care of the people in the village. They would rather have it the way it is and not change the way it goes.

b. Resources Reports:

STATE OF ALASKA DEPARTMENT OF FISH &GAME (543-2433)

o Wildlife Conservation Division: Phillip Perry & Patrick Jones- Confirmed

Phillip Perry- There are 12 proposals coming up in the Board of Game in Kotzebue. Brief update on the Moose season for the Kuskokwim: 118 moose were harvest in a 6 day hunt. 11 hundred people reported that they hunted moose out of the nearly 1600 that got registration permits. In the Goodnews Hunt, 42 residents of Platinum and Goodnews Bay got permits and harvested 15 moose.

No proposals for Caribou, this regulatory year the first time they are going to be required for harvest reporting information. Unit 18, 17, 19, we try to manage caribou consistently in that area. RC 503. Mulchatna Caribou is no long declining.

(Translated by P. Samson into Yupik)

Stanley Anthony- (Comments Scratched), 2nd Point of Order Called

<u>Jacqueline Cleveland</u>, <u>Quinhagak</u>- I'm worried about the moose management. To open federal lands.

<u>Phillip Perry, ADFG-</u> You can ask, whether or not the federal system. There is more moose... it depends on what the community wants and how they want it.

(Jacqueline Cleveland, Quinhagak translates conversation in Yupik)

Stanley Anthony, Nightmute: (Comments Scratched), 2 ½ Point of Order Called Pat Samson, Bethel (Translated Question of Order): If people can go hunt, because they don't have any food. Would it be alright to hunt moose and muskox out of season? Would it cause a hardship cause?

<u>Phillip Perry</u>, <u>ADFG</u>- Short answer is no, seasons are set up... they don't really make hardship. The only way moose that are harvested out of season, for those with low income you can get a hunting license for \$5.00.

Stanley Anthony, Nightmute: Then why don't you change this... (Comments were scratched). Warning Point of Order was called again on Stanley Anthony.

Chairman David Bill, Toksook Bay: There are some people on the island where I'm from; they did not get enough herring or salmon this spring. We knew that there was going to be shortage of food. There was a message I was asked to report to you, there will be more stories about fish in March. There is musk-ox on the mainland, we need to hunt moose somehow, question: "If we don't have anything to eat or during the festival time. We would like to hunt Musk-ox out of season to put food on the table. Is this possible?

We never had musk-ox before, now we do.

<u>Charlie Spud, Mekoryuk-</u> If I'm stranded in the wilderness and I got no more food, can I take a moose or muskox for food? Spring time muskox wanders on to the ice and I want to know if we can take those on the ice?

<u>Phillip Perry, ADFG</u>- There is special provisions for taking big game that are stranded. There is a provision in state law; they are allowed to take game animals, until they are out of dire emergency.

Ken Acton, AK Wildlife Trooper: That is correct, that law is for emergency only if there are no other means of survival. If it is in the village that is not covered by state law. If there is a funeral service contact ADFG to issue a ceremonial harvest.

<u>Chairman David Bill, Toksook Bay-</u> We have 4 wolves down on the Nelson Island. They are always coming and eating the Muskox.

<u>Phillip Perry, ADFG</u>- August, tracking November. If you know anyone with hunting or trapping license they can go hunting for them. The only thing would be to get the animal sealed. It's an open season and are long seasons

Chairman David Bill, Toksook Bay- A hungry person is more dangerous than a lion or bear.

o Commercial Fisheries Division: Travis Ellison- Teleconference 5:23PM

Hand out: (2013 Preliminary Kuskokwim Area Salmon Season Summary)

Travis Ellison, ADFG- The Kuskokwim River salmon fisheries were managed according to the Kuskokwim River Salmon Management Plan (5 AAC 07.365). The Kuskokwim Bay salmon fisheries were managed according Goodnews Bay Weir. We went into the fishery pretty conservatively, one thing we did that was new this year in district 5. We only had them fishing on the platinum side of the bay. They were catching a lot more Chinook out in the mouth of Goodnews Bay than Platinum. That fishery was built for maximum escapement, we had below escarpments. Sockeye and Chum salmon catches were below average, average for Chum salmon. Quinhagak... next year in Goodnews south district openers next season, end of June early July, to see the kings get through the openers. Quinhagak district 4, below Chinook salmon 2012 was a really low year, average 15,000 or better. We didn't meet our escapement goal for the weir counts, 2012... improvement. Conservation managers we did miss a part of the (...) salmon. (Refer to hand out of numbers). Kuskokwim River salmon fishery, little run, we let the subsistence proceed without restrictions. Akiak was getting good catches. The run had abruptly shut off, we restricted the subsistence fishery that started on June 28 in the lower Kuskokwim and went through July 6 (Rolling restrictions). Next year we are going into the next season with restrictions. (Refer to hand out for numbers)

Subsistence Division: Jeff Park- Confirmed
 <u>Jeff Park, ADFG</u>- Upcoming research (hand out), Akiachak, Chevak, Nicolai... Bethel
 Comprehensive Survey, completed in April complete subsistence harvest by Bethel
 residents. Ongoing/ Upcoming projects. I'm here to talk about muskox hunting in
 response to a BOG proposal, C&T, input, speakers to document the importance of
 Muskox over generations.

Stan Atchak- Do you have a check list that you use for your surveys? How long is the interview?

<u>Jeff Parks, ADFG-</u> Yes, we do have a checklist and the average time is about 30 min. <u>Stanly Anthony, Nightmute-</u> (Comments Scratched) 3rd Point of Order. Final Warning. (Alissa Joseph, ADFG Clarification to Order of topic.)

<u>John Phillip, Sr., Kongiganak</u>- Ocean hunting way back in the day and found a lot of Chinook at the mouth of the river, he did catch the Chinook in May of Spring time. Those salmon are the first pulse that goes up under the ice. There additional stories from back in the day, (Point of Order).

Fisheries Project: Tom Doolittle- Invited

o Chinook Salmon Fisheries: Steve Miller- Confirmed

Steve Miller, USFWS- Through the office of OSM there are a few questions that were asked about Chinook staging within the system. After Bethel, somewhere between 7-10 days, from Bethel to Tuluksak, Kwethluk, it's approximately 17 days. One of the things that I wanted to address. (Reference to hand out) If you look at the first page, you will see the adult escapement has been a concern. There is a project that was looking at juvenile rearing habitat, if you look at Chinook juveniles, Coho you can see there is downward spiral. I was looking at the escapement this past summer. The escapement was below the

goals. If you go to the fact sheet with the work that we have done, it's an ongoing project. This basically addresses research projects, funding from OSM to fund these projects then another fact sheet after that one. Life is changing it is not the same. I didn't have a lot of information, but if you have fisheries question, I can address them.

Stan Atchak, Chevak- Questions regarding times of weirs projects, funding, and dates. The RAC meeting will be meeting 13-14 November 2013, weir, survey and project will be up for approval and funding. I can get that list if you would like. As far as fisheries project, all we have is the McGrath and the SORAN site at Kwethluk. One of the things that you have to remember are index days (Same time every year). We rarely see any fish till June 25th. June 15th- September 20th. We try to get those projects in at that time. Chairman David Bill, Toksook Bay- Why are the salmon getting fewer? Trawlers are they a problem and fishing in the bay?

Steve Miller, USFW- How many adult Chinook would we get back from 5 thousand eggs? We get 2.5 fish back. Chinook will stay in the system for 1 year and go to sea for 6-7 years. What is making the trend going down: Low returns, survival rate, for example: Kwethluk was frozen April and May, it kills the fry salmon. These low productive cycles, it may continue for years. Yes, the numbers of the salmon are declining. Harvest is harvest; those questions would be for another agency.
