Dall Sheep Working Group Meeting January 30 & 31, 2016 Wedgewood Resort, Fairbanks, Alaska

Meeting Summary

The Dall Sheep Working Group met in Fairbanks, January 30 & 31, 2016 at the Wedgewood Resort. Thirty-eight working group members were present along with agency staff and members of the public. (See attendance list on pages 3 and 4.) The meeting was facilitated by Dr. Alistair Bath. He began the meeting by providing highlights from the December meeting. Afterwards, and throughout the meeting, the working group was divided into small groups of four to six members and each group was asked to provide comments/answers to questions and topics raised by Dr. Bath.
