On March 18th, Kirk Lingofelt celebrated **25 years** with the Department of Fish & Game! In his early years with the HIT

Program, Kirk built the shotgun ranges at the Rabbit Creek Shooting Park, traveled around the state teaching Alaskans firearm safety and outdoor recreation skills out of the mobile trailer, was instrumental in developing the



muzzleloader ed certification course, and more recently took on the role of Statewide Hunter Education Coordinator.


Hunter Education Instructor of the Year Bill Kubik, Wasilla

Since becoming an instructor in 2018, Bill has taught 46 hunter ed, 10 bow ed, and 1 crossbow ed course certifying 723 students. Bill is always



willing to help if a class needs an additional instructor and his enthusiasm for teaching is reflected in his actions. Bill works easily with other instructors and is a great mentor to new instructors.

HIT Program Outstanding Educator of the Year Joedy Wake, Anchorage



Joedy is a jack of all trades, teaching all 4 certification disciplines and coaching a team for the Rabbit Creek Youth Shotgun League multiple sessions for throughout the year. Joedy has taught 44 hunter ed, 19

bow ed, 3 muzzleloader ed, and 1 crossbow ed course certifying 964 students. Joedy loves to share his passion for hunting, dogs, and meat processing with his students.

Bowhunter Education Instructor of the Year Ken Calkins, Salcha



While Ken has only been an instructor since 2022. October he's become an integral part of the Fairbanks instructor team. He's taught 6 bow ed courses certifying 56 students. With bowhunter

ed classes just starting in Fairbanks, we'll definitely keep him busy for another season.

Apprentice Instructor of the Year Sophie Reid, Palmer

Sophie got certified in February 2023 and has already taught 4 hunter ed classes certifying 51 students. Sophie has a positive attitude and works well with other instructors. Her role as an apprentice instructor allows her to be a positive mentor to her peers, as



she is able to demonstrate exemplary firearm safety skills.

Lifetime Achievement Award Ellen Hannan, Craig



Ellen has been teaching hunter and bow ed courses on Prince of Wales Island for over 20 years. She's taught 17 bow ed and 30 hunter ed courses certifying 257 students. Due to its small population, POW typically only offers one class per year, but Ellen promotes firearm safety and assists with other

shooting classes at the POW Shooting Club throughout the year. According to a fellow instructor, "Ellen's biggest contribution is sharing her knowledge and love of the resources in our state and on our island."





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Lifetime Achievement Award Fred Voss, Anchorage

Fred started teaching hunter ed in 1994, and since then has taught 70 hunter ed, 56 bow ed, 19 muzzleloader ed, and 1 crossbow ed course certifying 2,290 students. Fred has taught classes in Anchorage, Kodiak, Kenai, and Kotzebue, and has helped mentor many new instructors. To fellow instructors he is known as an excellent communicator and team player.

Legacy Award Vikki Gross, Wasilla

Vikki has been an instructor since the early 1990's. She's taught 24 bow ed and 16 hunter ed course certifying 654 students. Vikki is a Board Member and very active with the Cook Inlet Archers, and is working with the HIT Program

to offer bow ed field days at their new classroom facility in Chugiak. The Legacy Award recognizes "a current or past instructor who has left a lasting legacy in their community, passed on their hunting/firearms knowledge, and contributed to the success of the HIT Program for many years. They exemplify the spirit of the HIT Program and share it with fellow instructors and the students."
