EXPLANATION:

This emergency order prohibits sport fishing for king salmon in the salt waters of Cook Inlet north of the latitude of Bluff Point beginning 12:01 a.m., Saturday, July 26, 2014, through 11:59 p.m., Thursday, July 31, 2014. King salmon may not be retained or possessed. King salmon caught while fishing for other species may not be removed from the water and must be released immediately.

REGULATION:

Consistent with the stipulations within 5 AAC 21.359. Kenai River Late-Run King Salmon Management Plan. (d)(1), the provisions of 5 AAC 58.022. Waters; seasons; bag, possession, and size limits; and special provisions for Cook Inlet – Resurrection Bay Saltwater Area. (b)(1)(A) are superseded by this emergency order. Under this emergency order, the following provisions are effective, beginning 12:01 a.m., Saturday, July 26, 2014, through 11:59 p.m., Thursday, July 31, 2014:

5 AAC 58.022. Waters; seasons; bag, possession, and size limits; and special provisions for Cook Inlet – Resurrection Bay Saltwater Area.

(b)(1) in the waters of Cook Inlet north of the latitude of Bluff Point (59° 40.00' N. lat.):

(A) sport fishing for king salmon is prohibited, king salmon may not be retained or possessed; king salmon that are caught may not be removed from the water and must be released immediately;

JUSTIFICATION:

A primary purpose of 5 AAC 21.359. *Kenai River Late-Run King Salmon Management Plan* is to ensure adequate escapement of late-run king salmon into the Kenai River. The plan specifies that, if the projected late-run king salmon escapement is less than 15,000 king salmon, the department shall close the sport fisheries in the Kenai River and in the salt waters of Cook Inlet north of the latitude of Bluff Point to the taking of king salmon.

The sustainable escapement goal (SEG) for Kenai River late-run king salmon is 15,000 to 30,000 king salmon. As of July 23, the cumulative estimate of king salmon passage into the Kenai River was 8,023 fish. The projected sport harvest and catch and release mortality of king salmon in the Kenai River upstream of the sonar through the end of the season as estimated by an in-season creel survey is approximately 645 fish. Based on average run-timing models, the projected spawning escapement over the last four days has stabilized at an estimate of 13,500 to 14,000 fish, indicating the sustainable

escapement goal will not be achieved. Therefore, it is warranted to close sport fishing for late-run king salmon in the Kenai River and in the salt waters of Cook Inlet north of the latitude of Bluff Point to the taking of king salmon as specified in the *Kenai River Late-Run King Salmon Management Plan*.
