EXPLANATION:

This emergency order rescinds Emergency Order 1-9-98 implemented on June 6, 1998. This emergency order allows surplus hatchery-produced king salmon to be harvested in all fresh water drainages crossed by the Juneau City and Borough road system that are open to sport fishing. The daily bag and possession limit is two king salmon 28 inches or more in length and two king salmon less than 28 inches in length. This emergency order also allows the use of bait in the fresh waters of Fish Creek Pond (Douglas Island), and also allows anglers at the Fish Creek Pond to retain king salmon hooked elsewhere than in the mouth. Anglers fishing in Fish Creek Pond are allowed to use weighted hooks and lures and multiple hooks with gap between point and shank larger than one-half inch.

This emergency order is in effect from July 23 through September 30, 1998.

REGULATION:

The provisions of 5 AAC 47.022(32) are superseded and the provisions of 5 AAC 47.022(203) are added by this emergency order. Under this emergency order, the following provisions are effective:

JUSTIFICATION:

The Alaska Board of Fisheries authorized the department to use its emergency order authority to open fresh waters to the harvest of surplus hatchery-produced king salmon. Hatchery-produced king salmon returning to Juneau area streams are not needed for broodstock. Therefore, the department is opening these freshwater systems to provide recreational anglers with the opportunity to harvest these surplus fish.

The Alaska Board of Fisheries also authorized the department to use its emergency order authority to liberalize methods and means of harvest if there is a surplus of hatchery-produced king salmon available in terminal harvest areas. The department expects that few fish will return to most fresh water streams crossed by the Juneau road system, with the exception of the Fish Creek Pond on Douglas Island. Therefore, the department is permitting anglers to use bait in the Fish Creek Pond to increase harvest of these fish. The use of bait is prohibited in all other freshwater drainages crossed by the Juneau road system from November 16 through September 14, except for Twin Lakes and Salmon Creek Reservoir where bait is allowed throughout the year. Additionally, to further increase utilization of the king salmon at the Fish Creek Pond, anglers may retain king salmon hooked elsewhere than in the mouth. Anglers may also use weighted hooks and lures and multiple hooks with gap between point and shank larger than one-half inch to increase their efficiency in snagging king salmon.
