## *Emergency Order*

### EXPLANATION:

This emergency order closes the first and fifth opening weekend and the five Wednesday openings in May and June for the Anchor River drainage and decreases the waters of the Anchor River drainage open to sport fishing to the downstream side of the Old Sterling Highway Bridge approximately 550 feet below the junction of the North and South Forks. This emergency order is effective from 12:01 a.m., Wednesday, April 1, 2015, through 11:59 p.m., Tuesday, June 30, 2015.

### REGULATION:

The provisions of 5 AAC 56.122. Special provisions for the seasons, bag, possession, annual, and size limits, and methods and means for the Kenai Peninsula Area. (a)(2)(C), (a)(2)(C)(i) and (a)(2)(E) are superseded by this emergency order. Under this emergency order, the following provisions are effective from 12:01 a.m., Wednesday, April 1, 2015, through 11:59 p.m., Tuesday, June 30, 2015:

#### **5 AAC 56.122. Special provisions for the seasons, bag, possession, annual, and size limits, and methods and means for the Kenai Peninsula Area.**

(a)(2) Anchor River drainage, except the Bridge Creek Reservoir:

(C) from its mouth upstream to the downstream side of the Old Sterling Highway Bridge located approximately 550 feet below the junction of the North and South Forks sport fishing is open

(i) on Memorial Day weekend, and the Monday following that weekend, and the following two weekends and the Monday following each of those weekends; and

(E) sport fishing is open for king salmon from its mouth upstream to the downstream side of the Old Sterling Highway Bridge, located approximately 550 feet below the junction of the North and South Forks, only on Memorial Day weekend, and the Monday following that weekend, and the following two weekends and the Monday following each of those weekends; for king salmon 20 inches or greater in length, the bag and possession limit is one fish; a person may not retain more than two king salmon 20 inches or greater in length each year from the Anchor River, Deep Creek, Ninilchik River, and all marine waters south of the latitude of the mouth of the Ninilchik River (60° 03.99' N. lat.) to the latitude of Bluff Point (59° 40.00' N. lat.) combined; a harvest record is required as specified in 5 AAC 75.006; a person who takes and retains a king salmon 20 inches or greater in length from either Ninilchik River, Deep Creek or Anchor River may not sport fish in any of these drainages for the rest of that day; a king salmon 20 inches or greater in length that is removed from the water must be retained and becomes a part of the bag limit of the person originally hooking it; a person may not remove a king salmon from the water before releasing the fish;

**JUSTIFICATION:**

The sustainable escapement goal (SEG) for Anchor River king salmon is 3,800–10,000 fish. In 2014, the SEG was not achieved despite restricting the inriver and marine sport fisheries preseason and inseason. In 2012 and 2013, the SEG was achieved using a combination of inriver and marine preseason and inseason restrictions. From 2009–2011, the SEG was not achieved when only inseason restrictions were used to reduce the inriver and marine sport harvest of king salmon. The 2015 Anchor River king salmon run is expected to be below the historical average and may be similar to the 2014 run when escapement was the lowest since 2003. Aligning Anchor River openings with Deep Creek and Ninilchik River openings will avoid transferred effort to the Anchor River when it is the only Lower Cook Inlet stream open for king salmon fishing.

The recent poor king salmon runs in Lower Cook Inlet streams and the uncertainty for how quickly the runs may rebound, justify starting the 2015 season more conservatively than in 2014. It is anticipated the suite of inriver and marine restrictions will provide the greatest potential for achieving escapement and egg-take goals and minimizing shifting effort due to conservation actions on the Anchor and Ninilchik rivers while providing some fishing opportunity.

Increased harvest opportunity may be allowed by subsequent emergency order if inseason assessment indicates the runs are stronger than anticipated and sufficiently strong enough to achieve goals.

**PREVIOUS EMERGENCY ORDERS AFFECTED:**

Emergency Order No. 2-KS-7-02-15 limits sport fishing gear to only one unbaited, single-hook, artificial lure when fishing in the Anchor River, Deep Creek, or Ninilchik River drainages beginning 12:01 a.m., Wednesday, April 1, 2015, through 11:59 p.m., Tuesday, June 30, 2015.

Emergency Order No. 2-KS-7-03-15 establishes a combined annual limit of two king salmon 20 inches or greater in length for fish harvested in the Anchor River, Deep Creek, and Ninilchik River and all marine waters south of the latitude of the mouth of the Ninilchik River (60° 03.99' N. lat.) to the latitude of Bluff Point (59° 40.00' N. lat.). This emergency order remains in effect from 12:01 a.m., Wednesday, April 1, 2015 through 11:59 p.m., Wednesday, July 15, 2015.

Emergency Order No. 2-KS-7-04-15 extends the date by two weeks of the closed saltwater area surrounding the Anchor River mouth and the Special Harvest Areas north to 59° 52.98' N. located approximately one mile south of Stariski Creek and south to Bluff Point (59° 40.00' N. lat.) This emergency order is effective from 12:01 a.m., Wednesday, July 1, 2015 through 11:59 p.m., Wednesday, July 15, 2015.
