Sport Fishing Regulations 2007-2008



† **Windfall Lake outlet stream** → **NO BAIT:** Nov. 16—Sept. 14

† Includes the Windfall Lake outlet stream AND that part of the Herbert River within 100 yd of its confluence with the Windfall Lake outlet stream.

Windfall Lake → **BAIT PROHIBITED AT ALL TIMES** ~ Only unbaited, artificial lures may be used.

CLOSURES † **Windfall Lake outlet stream** ~ **Closed to fishing** June 1–July 31, except that fishing is allowed on Wednesdays and Saturdays during the month of June.

Windfall Lake ~ **Closed year-round to fishing for SOCKEYE SALMON.**
(and its inlet streams) Open year-round for all other species.

HARVEST AND SIZE LIMITS

Cutthroat and rainbow trout (in combination): 2 daily, 2 in possession, 14-inch minimum and 22-inch maximum size limit

Steelhead: 1 daily, 2 in possession, 36-inch minimum size limit.

ANNUAL LIMIT of 2 fish.

Harvest record required → →

Dolly Varden: 2 daily, 2 in possession; no size limit.

Coho salmon: 16 inches or longer: 2 daily, 2 in possession.

A nontransferable HARVEST RECORD must be in possession of each person sport fishing for STEELHEAD in Southeast Alaska. A harvest record appears on the back of each sport fishing license. For anglers not required to have a sport fishing license, harvest records are available free of charge from ADF&G offices and license vendors in Southeast Alaska. Immediately upon landing a steelhead 36 inches or longer, anglers must enter the date and location of catch, in ink, on the back of their sport fishing license or harvest record.

Pink and chum salmon: 16 inches or longer: 6 of each species daily, 12 of each species in possession

Coho, pink and chum salmon: Less than 16 inches: combined limit of 10 salmon daily, combined limit of 10 in possession.

Sockeye salmon (in Windfall Lake outlet stream† only):
16 inches or longer: 1 per day, 1 in possession
Less than 16 inches: 10 per day, 10 in possession

METHODS AND MEANS Fish may NOT be taken in fresh water by means of: (1) fixed or weighted hooks and lures (except those of standard manufacture), (2) multiple hooks with a gap between point and shank larger than one-half inch, (3) spear, or (4) arrow. It is unlawful to intentionally snag or attempt to snag any fish in fresh water. “Snag” means to hook a fish elsewhere than in its mouth. A fish unintentionally hooked elsewhere than in its mouth must be released immediately.
