



The trail starts across the railroad tracks on the east side of the valley, east of the downtown area. From the ferry terminal, walk into town (the main street is Broadway) across some tracks by the railroad depot, to the Golden North Hotel. Turn right and within the same block turn left by the Klondike Hotel, then immediately right toward the hillside. The Dewey Lake sign will be plainly visible ahead and can be reached by crossing a footbridge over a stream and the railroad tracks. (Cross with care.) The trail will then be seen running up the hillside at an angle. Follow it past a couple of picnic tables on an overlook about 70 yards from the sign and 100 feet above sea level. The trail continues uphill over two wooden bridges past two water towers, and a little over a quarter of a mile from the beginning reaches another viewpoint. Although the trail winds
