

EXPLANATION:

This emergency order opens portions of state caribou registration hunt RC867 (Fortymile Caribou Herd). State registration permit hunt RC867 for the Fortymile Caribou Herd is divided into 3 zones. This emergency order opens zone 1 in all of Game Management Unit 20B except the Chatanika drainage and in Game Management Unit 25C those portions south and east of the mainstem of Birch Creek upstream to its confluence with Crooked Creek Fork, then south of the mainstem of Crooked Creek Fork. All other caribou hunting regulations in Units 20 and 25 are not affected by this emergency order.



REGULATION:

Therefore, the following regulations in **5AAC 85.025(a)(15)** and **(20)**, **HUNTING SEASONS AND BAG LIMITS FOR CARIBOU**, are superseded by this emergency order, and the following provisions are effective for hunting caribou:

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All other caribou hunting regulations in Units 20 and 25 are not affected by this emergency order.

JUSTIFICATION:

The Alaska Board of Game endorsed the Fortymile Caribou Herd Harvest Plan as a means of guiding harvest of the herd from 2006 through 2012. The annual harvest quota for the Fortymile Caribou Herd is allocated seasonally: 75% to the fall hunt and 25%, plus any surplus from the fall quota, to the winter hunt. This winter's harvest quota is 340 caribou. The winter quota is divided between the 2 road-accessible portions of the hunt area, the Steese Highway–Chena Hot Springs area in Units 20B and 25C (Zone 1) and the Taylor Highway area in Unit 20E (Zone 3). Sixty percent of the harvest quota is allocated to the road-accessible zone with the most caribou within reach of hunters immediately prior to the season opening. Zone 2, the roadless area between Zones 1 and 3, is included with the quota for the hunt area with the most caribou. The winter caribou season in Zone 1 did not open on December 1 as scheduled because large numbers of caribou were close to the Steese Highway, and the harvest quota of 205 would have been exceeded in a few hours. Large numbers of caribou still remain close to the Steese Highway, however areas away from highway in southern Zone 1 currently have lower numbers of caribou and hunting opportunity can be provided in those areas. The department plans to reopen the hunt areas close to the Steese Highway when the caribou have dispersed sufficiently for harvest to be managed without exceeding the harvest auota.
