Registration Hunts for Kenai Peninsula Mountain Goats Open Nov. 1

(Homer) – Registration permit hunts RG361 and RG364 for mountain goats in Game Management Unit 15 will open on November 1. A limited number of permits will be available beginning at 8:00 a.m. on Wednesday, October 28, at Alaska Department of Fish and Game offices in Homer, Soldotna, Anchorage, and Palmer, and online at

Permits will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis and will be valid for seven days. Bag limits are one goat per hunter.

RG361 is open to Alaska resident and nonresident hunters. Fifteen permits will be issued for the hunt, located in the Halibut Cove area between Grewingk Creek and the Wosnesenski River.

RG364 is open to Alaska residents only. Twelve permits will be issued for the hunt, located south of the divide from Jakolof Bay to Rocky Bay and north of the divide from Port Graham Bay to Windy Bay.

Hunters who have harvested a nanny (female goat) in Units 7 or 15 since 2010 are not eligible to participate in these hunts. Hunters who harvest a nanny during these hunts will be ineligible to hunt goats in Units 7 or 15 for five years.
