EXPLANATION:

This emergency order shortens the hunting season for bull moose by 5 days in a portion of Game Management Unit 20B during regulatory year 2018–2019. Those portions of Unit 20B not including the Fairbanks Management Area, Minto Flats Management Area, and the Middle Fork of the Chena River and the Salcha River upstream of Goose Creek will end on September 15. The bag limit will continue to be one bull. Other moose seasons throughout Unit 20B will be the same as in previous years.

REGULATION:

Therefore, the following regulations in 5AAC 85.045(a)(18), HUNTING SEASONS AND BAG LIMITS FOR MOOSE, are superseded by this emergency order, and the following provisions are in effect for hunting moose:

All other moose hunting regulations in Unit 20B remain unchanged and are not affected by this emergency order.

JUSTIFICATION:

A bull-to-cow ratio of 30 bulls per 100 cows is desirable in order to maintain adequate numbers of bull moose in Unit 20B. This ratio has been declining since 2015 and is now 17 bulls per 100 cows, an indication that the harvest of bull moose is too high. Prior to 2011, Unit 20B had a September 1–15 moose season for residents and a September 5–15 moose season for nonresidents. The Board of Game lengthened the season in 2011 because the moose population was above the objective of 12,000–15,000 moose and the harvestable surplus of bulls was high. Now that the moose population has decreased to 12,871 moose, a more appropriate level for the available habitat, returning the moose season to the pre-2011 dates during the coming regulatory year may alleviate the low bull-to-cow ratio and allow it to return to the objective of 30 bulls per 100 cows.
