

# 2018-2019 Alaska Subsistence **Permit Hunt Supplement**

See pages 1-3 for Tier II information and page 4 for Tier I Nelchina caribou and Unit 13 Community Harvest information.

Under state law, all Alaska residents are eligible for subsistence hunting of game populations where subsistence use occurs.

If the harvestable portion of a game population is not sufficient to provide a reasonable opportunity for all subsistence uses, the Board of Game shall distinguish among subsistence users, through limitations based on:

- The customary and direct dependence on the game population by the subsistence user for human consumption as a mainstay of livelihood; and
- The ability of the subsistence user to obtain food if subsistence use is restricted or eliminated.

### **Permit Hunt Conditions**

- Hunters must have in possession a valid hunting license, necessary permits, and if needed, big game locking-tags. Alaska residents 17 years of age and younger are not required to have a hunting license. Additional conditions may be listed under the description of each hunt.
- Properly completed permit hunt reports must be returned by the date specified on the permit, even if you did not hunt or were unsuccessful. If you did not return last year's Drawing, Targeted, Tier II, or Registration (including Tier I Nelchina caribou) report, even if the postal service lost your report, you will be ineligible for all Drawing, Targeted, Tier II, and Registration permits for the next regulatory year.
- Permits are not transferable to another person, with the following exception:
  - Active duty military personnel deployed to a combat zone who are unable to use their Tier II permit may transfer their permit to a substitute hunter who is a resident of Alaska. ## Instructions for Applying for Tier II Permit Hunts

(Complete instructions available online and on the back of the Tier II application.)

- · Only Alaska residents who will be 10 years of age or older by the starting date of the hunt may apply for Tier II permits.
- · A hunter may apply for more than one hunt, but must complete a separate application for each hunt. No individual may hold more than one Tier II permit for a species.
- · Only one Tier II permit may be issued to a household for moose or muskox. Up to three Tier II permits may be issued to a household for caribou.

### Questions 1-11:

- Driver's License or State ID Number
- Date of birth
- · First name, middle initial, and last name
- · Complete mailing address, city, state and zip code
- · Community of principal residence
- 12: Total years of Alaska residency.

13: Each Tier II hunt is assigned a hunt number. Check this supplement for the correct number of the hunt for which you are applying, then enter the complete number.

14: If you are applying for more than one Tier II hunt for a species, write the choice number in the box indicating if this hunt is your first, second, etc. choice.

Scored Questions 15-19: See the explanation of point scoring listed at right. If a question is left blank, you will receive the minimum score for that question. On the back of the application, please list other members of your household who are also submitting Tier II application(s).

Sign your application. Any application which is illegible, has incorrect hunt numbers, or is missing required information (including signature) will not be considered. In addition, applications containing false information will be reported to Alaska Wildlife Troopers for investigation.

## **Proxy Hunting in Tier II Hunts**

- You may proxy hunt for caribou in Tier II hunts.
- You may proxy hunt for moose in Tier II hunts.
- Antler destruction is required for both the hunter's animal and the beneficiary's animal, and must occur at the kill site unless uncut antlers must be submitted to ADF&G for measuring, in which case antler destruction will be completed after measuring by ADF&G.

## **Hunter Education Requirements**

 Requirements for hunters before hunting in <u>Units 7, 13, 14, 15, and 20</u>: If you were born after January 1, 1986 and are 16 years old or older, you must have successfully completed an ADF&G-approved Basic Hunter Education course before you hunt in the units listed above.

If you are under 16 years of age, you must have either successfully completed an ADF&Gapproved Basic Hunter Education course or be under the direct immediate supervision of a licensed hunter who is:

- (a) 16 years of age or older and has successfully completed an ADF&G-approved Basic
- Hunter Education course, **-OR-** (b) born on or before January 1, 1986.
- Hunters aged 10-17 with an ADF&G-approved Basic Hunter Education course, or hunters under the age of 10, are allowed to hunt on behalf of an adult permit holder under the direct and immediate supervision of that adult. The adult permit holder must be a licensed hunter, 16 or older, and is responsible for ensuring all legal requirements are met.

## Attention all Bowhunters

All hunters who want to participate in archery-only hunts must have successfully completed an ADF&G-approved bowhunter education course prior to applying. Hunters born on or after January 1, 1986 and using a bow and arrow to hunt big game must have successfully completed an ADF&G· approved bowhunter education course.

## Apply Online by 5 p.m. (AKST) December 15!

Applications must be submitted online or mailed to the address shown on the application form. If you apply by mail, it is your responsibility to make certain the envelope gets postmarked by Nov. 30. Some post offices routinely pouch mail without postmarking it and send it on to a larger distribution center where it is postmarked 24-48 hours later! We suggest you hand-carry your envelope into the post office, ask that it be postmarked, and then look at the postmark to make certain it says Nov. 30 or earlier. Also note that a postmark means a U.S. Postal Service postmark. Postage You may apply online beginning November 1 and ending December 15 at 5 p.m. (AKST).

### Point Scoring

Each Tier II application is scored on the basis of the information provided by the applicant. Answers may be subject to verification. A total of up to 140 points is possible. There are 5 questions (15-19) on the application that are used for scoring in all Tier II hunts.

- 15. Up to 50 points are awarded for the number of years the applicant has hunted or eaten meat from the game population in the hunt area, or would have hunted this population, but did not because the hunt was cancelled or the applicant was unsuccessful in obtaining a drawing or Tier II permit for this population. One point is awarded for each year.
- Up to 10 points are awarded for the number of years any one member of the household has hunted or eaten meat, or would have hunted this population, but did not because the hunt was cancelled or the household member was unsuccessful in obtaining a drawing or Tier II permit for this population. One-fifth of a point is awarded for each year.
- 17. Up to 25 points are awarded for the number of days you spent hunting and/or fishing during the last regulatory year in the Tier II hunt area for which you are applying. The maximum number of points will be awarded to applicants who hunted and fished in the area for 70 days or more during the last regulatory year.
- 18. Up to 25 points are awarded for the cost of food in the community where most of the applicant's household store-bought food was purchased during the past year. Points received may not exceed the points calculated by the department using the cost-of-food index for the community nearest the applicant's residence.
- 19. Up to 30 points are awarded for the cost of automotive fuel in the community where most of the applicant's household automotive fuel was purchased during the past year. Points received may not exceed the points calculated by the department using the cost of automotive fuel for the community nearest the applicant's residence.

### Most **Common Errors**

Last year, 2,133 Tier II permit applications were submitted. Of these, about 3% were rejected. The most common errors causing applications to be rejected were: missing information, providing an invalid hunt number, failing to sign an application, falsifying an application, and being younger than 10 years old.

## **Frequently Asked Questions**

1. Do only Alaska residents qualify to apply for Tier II subsistence permits? Yes. You must be a resident at the time of application. A resident for Tier II means a person who has continually maintained his or her permanent home in Alaska for 365 days preceding the start of the Tier II hunt of interest. Members of the military services and their dependents who have been stationed in the state for the preceding 12 consecutive months are also residents for Tier II purposes.


2. How are Tier II permits awarded? Each application is scored on 5 questions. Permits for a specific hunt are issued starting at the highest overall score and working downward until all permits are issued. If there are Tier II permits remaining, but a pool of applicants with the same score is too large to award all permits, a random drawing will be held to award the remaining permits.

- 3. How many Tier II permits may an individual be awarded? Only one Tier II permit per species may be awarded. Therefore, it is important that those applying for more than one hunt for the same species identify whether a hunt is their first, second, third, etc. choice for that species. If more individuals in a household are eligible for permits based on their score than can be allowed, the highest scoring individual(s) in the household will be awarded permit(s). When more than one household member applies for Tier II hunts, household applicants must be listed on each application.
- 4. Can I have both a Drawing permit and a Tier II permit for the same species? Yes. A person can be selected for a Drawing permit and also be awarded a Tier II permit for the same species. However an individual's bag limit does not increase. Upon harvesting an animal under one permit, the other permit automatically becomes invalid, however, you must still submit both hunt reports. The Drawing and Tier II permit systems are separate processes and your application for receiving a permit in one system does not affect your opportunity to apply for or receive a permit in the other.
- 5. Is there any difference in my chances of receiving a permit for my first choice hunt as opposed to my second or third choices? No. Each hunt is scored independently. If you qualify for more than one permit for a given species, you will receive the permit for the hunt which you indicated was your highest preference. If you do not identify a preference, you will receive a permit for the hunt in which you receive the highest score.
- 6. If I qualify for a permit for one species, does that affect my opportunity to receive a permit for another species? No. Each hunt is scored independently. Your potential to qualify for a permit is dependent upon your score in relation to the scores of other applicants for the same hunt.

Applicants may appeal a Tier II permit allocation decision or score to the Permit Hunt Administrator within 20 days of the public release of the list of names of those awarded Tier II permits. An appeal the 20-day appeal period. Telephone appeals will be recorded. A department form, available at most ADF&G offices, may be used, but is not required. The department will provide a decision on the appeal by first class mail within 7 days of appeal receipt. A person aggrieved by a decision under this appeal system may appeal to the ADF&G Commissioner within 7 days of the mailing of a decision by the Permit Hunt Administrator. The Department of Fish and Game may change a Tier II permit allocation decision or score in case of an ADF&G scoring error or based on evidence that information

Under 5 AAC 92.050, applications that are incomplete or contain false statements are void. Therefore, appeals asking to insert missing information or a signature, or asking to change answers to questions will be denied. # **Tier II Permit Hunt Areas**



Restricted Area for hunt TM940: **Dalton Highway Corridor Management Area** (DHCMA). Units 20, 24, 25, and 26 extending five miles from each side of the Dalton Highway, including the driveable surface of the Dalton Highway, from the Yukon River to the Arctic Ocean, and including the Prudhoe Bay Closed Area. The area within the Prudhoe Bay Closed Area is closed to the taking of big game; the remainder of the DHCMA is closed to hunting; however, big game, small game, and fur animals may be taken in the area by bow and arrow only; no motorized vehicle may be used to transport hunters, their gear, or parts of game within the DHCMA except aircraft, boats, and licensed high way vehicles on the following designated roads: 1 Dalton Highway; 2) Bettles Winter Trail during periods when BLM and the City of Bettles announce that the trail is open to winter travel; 3) Galbraith Lake road from the Dalton Highway to the BLM campground at Galbraith Lake, including the gravel pit access road when the gate is open; 4) Toolik Lake Road excluding the driveway to the Toolik Lake Research Facility; 5) the Sagavanirktok River access road two miles north of Pump Station 2; 6) any constructed roadway or gravel pit within 1/4 mile of the Dalton Highway. However, a snowmachine may be used to transport hunters, their hunting gear, or parts of game across the management area from land outside the management area to access land on the other side of the management area. Any hunter traveling on the Dalton Highway must stop at any check station operated by the department within the DHCMA.

## Unit 13 Tier I Nelchina Caribou RC561 or RC562

Alaska residents that would like to hunt caribou in Unit 13 must choose between applying for the Unit 13 Tier I caribou hunts (**RC561** or **RC562**), **OR** the community harvest caribou hunt (CSH), **OR** the caribou drawing hunt (DC485).

New! There are now two Tier I registration hunts that hunters will have to choose from during the open application period. Hunters may only select **one** hunt to apply for.

Members of a household that apply for a Unit 13 Tier I permit or CSH caribou permits are <u>NOT</u> eligible for <u>ANY</u> caribou drawing hunts.

A household includes any person currently living in the principal home, excluding persons boarding or renting in the home or relatives living in separate homes. All those applying must be residents at the time of application.

By applying for RC561 or RC562 you agree to all of the permit hunt conditions below:

## **Permit Hunt Conditions**

- If your household applies for a Unit 13 Tier I caribou permit, your household **WILL** receive a permit.
- No member of the household will be eligible to apply for or receive any other state caribou Drawing/Registration permits or general season caribou harvest tickets.
- No member of the household may hunt caribou outside of Unit 13.
- No member of the household will be eligible to apply for or receive any moose permits outside of Unit 13.
- No member of the household may hunt moose outside of Unit 13.
- Any member of the household may harvest the caribou.
- Prior to Oct. 1, meat of the forequarters, hindquarters, and ribs must remain naturally attached to the bone until delivered to the place where it is processed for human consumption.
- The one caribou bag limit may be changed by Emergency Order or the hunt may be closed by Emergency Order. It is your responsibility to check the status of the hunt and return your hunt report when the hunt closes.

## **Instructions for Applying for the Tier I Permit Hunt**

- The online application period begins Nov. 1 and ends Dec. 15, 2017 at 5 p.m. (AKST).
- Paper applications must be postmarked by Nov. 30 and received by Dec. 15, 2017.
- All members of the household 10 years of age and older must be listed on the application (including those who do not intend to hunt), and all members are bound by the hunt conditions for the entire regulatory year.
- The application must be signed by every person listed (parents/guardians may sign for minors).
- Apply only once per household; only one permit will be issued per household.
- Complete instructions available online and on the back of the Tier I application.

Please note: This is not a conventional registration hunt. You must apply during this application period; permits will not be available over the counter.

If you apply for this hunt, you and your household cannot participate in federal hunts for caribou or moose outside of Unit 13.

### **Proxy hunting in Unit 13:**

- For Unit 13 Tier I permit holders, no member of your household may proxy hunt for caribou or moose outside of Unit 13.
- You may only proxy hunt for one Unit 13 caribou per regulatory year.
- If you proxy hunt for Unit 13 Tier I caribou, you and your entire household cannot hunt moose or caribou outside of Unit 13 for the regulatory year.
- For households with members that have already hunted moose or caribou outside of Unit 13, no member of the household may proxy hunt Unit 13 Tier I caribou.

# **Community Subsistence Harvest (CSH) Hunts**

## Copper Basin CSH Caribou Hunt CC001

Caribou CSH hunters – Must be an Alaska resident at the time of application. No member of the household can hold any state Drawing/Tier I/Tier II/Registration caribou permits, or hold general season caribou harvest tickets. Copper Basin CSH Caribou hunters may apply for moose drawing hunts in Unit 13 only (DM324 and DM325).

- All group members must comply with all CSH hunting requirements for a two-year commitment. See the 2018-2019 Hunt Conditions for Copper Basin CSH Caribou for complete requirements at <a href="www.adfg.alaska.gov/index.cfm?adfg=huntlicense.cultural">www.adfg.alaska.gov/index.cfm?adfg=huntlicense.cultural</a>.
- Up to 400 caribou can be taken by all Copper Basin CSH groups/communities combined.
- Apply only once per household; only one permit will be issued per household.
- No member of the household may apply for state or federal moose or caribou permit hunts outside of the Copper Basin Community Hunt area (Unit 11, 13, and that portion of Unit 12 south of the Little Tok River).
- No member of the household may hold general season caribou harvest tickets or other state caribou permits. After the CSH hunt has ended, if the household was unsuccessful in filling the CSH bag limit during the CSH hunt, household members may hunt in areas outside the CSH hunt area with general season caribou harvest tickets or other state caribou permits where the bag limit is greater than one caribou per household.
- No member of the household may hunt moose outside of the Copper Basin Community Hunt area.
- Any member of the household listed on the harvest ticket may harvest the caribou.
  Hunters must salvage the heart, liver, kidneys, and fat, as well as all edible meat from
- the front quarters, hindquarters, ribs, neck, and backbone.

   Prior to Oct. 1, meat of the front quarters, hindquarters, and ribs must remain naturally attached to the bone until delivered to the place where it is processed for
- human consumption.
  The 1 caribou bag limit may be changed by Emergency Order or the hunt may be closed by Emergency Order. It is your responsibility to check the status of the hunt and return your hunt report when the hunt closes.
- Any member of the group may hunt on behalf of another member as a designated hunter.
- The group coordinator must submit an annual Coordinator Community Harvest Report.
   If the coordinator fails to do so, all group participants will be placed on the Failure to Report list and will not be eligible to participate in the CSH hunt during the following regulatory year.

## Copper Basin CSH Moose Hunt CM300

Season dates Aug. 20-Sept. 20
Season dates vary by area and may be closed by Emergency Order

Moose CSH hunters – Must be an Alaska resident at the time of application. No member of the household can hold any state Drawing/Tier II/Registration moose permits, or hold general season moose harvest tickets. Copper Basin CSH Moose hunters may apply for caribou hunts in Unit 13 only (DC485, RC561, or RC562).

- All group members must comply with all CSH hunting requirements for a two-year commitment. See the 2018-2019 Hunt Conditions for Copper Basin CSH Moose for complete requirements at <a href="www.adfg.alaska.gov/index.cfm?adfg=huntlicense.cultural">www.adfg.alaska.gov/index.cfm?adfg=huntlicense.cultural</a>.
- Up to 100 bull moose that do not meet general season antler restrictions ("any bull") may be taken in Units 11 and 13 during the fall season. When area-specific quotas are reached, the bag limit will revert to the general season antler restrictions for that area for the remainder of the season by Emergency Order. In the open portion of Unit 12, all community hunters must follow general season dates and antler restrictions.
- Locking-tags for the harvest of "any bull" moose will be distributed to participants using scoring criteria to determine the customary and direct dependence on the game population by the subsistence user for human consumption as a mainstay of livelihood. Hunters that do not have an "any bull" locking-tag in their possession must shoot a bull that conforms to the general season antler restrictions for the hunt area.
- Apply only once per household; one permit will be issued per household member.
- No member of the household may hold state or federal moose permits outside of the Copper Basin Community Hunt area (Unit 11, 13, and that portion of Unit 12 south of the Little Tok River) or hold general season moose harvest tickets. After the CSH hunt has ended, unsuccessful individual household members may then acquire state or federal moose harvest tickets or permits for other areas if the bag limit is greater than one moose per person.
- Hunters must salvage the head, heart, liver, kidneys, stomach, and hide, as well as all edible meat from the front quarters, hindquarters, ribs, neck, and backbone.
- For moose harvested in Unit 13, meat of the front quarters, hindquarters, and ribs must remain naturally attached to the bone until delivered to the place where it is processed for human consumption.
- Any member of the group may hunt on behalf of another member as a designated hunter.
- The group coordinator must submit an annual Coordinator Community Harvest Report. If the coordinator fails to do so, all group participants will be placed on the Failure to Report list and will not be eligible to participate in the CSH hunt during the following regulatory year.

## Instructions for Applying for Copper Basin CSH Hunts:

- The Copper Basin CSH Caribou and Moose hunts are separate; group coordinators and households may apply for both hunts or just one of the hunts.
- Group coordinators may apply beginning Oct. 1 and ending Dec. 15, 2017 at 5 p.m. (AKST). Applications can be submitted online at <a href="http://hunt.alaska.gov">http://hunt.alaska.gov</a>. Each group coordinator will be assigned a group number after the application has been processed. Early submission of the group coordinator's application is highly recommended to avoid administrative delays that could compromise the group's eligibility due to lack of membership. Groups or communities must have a minimum of 25 individuals to participate in the CSH hunt
- Households may apply beginning Nov. 1 and ending Dec. 15, 2017 at 5 p.m. (AKST). Applications can be submitted online at <a href="http://hunt.alaska.gov">http://hunt.alaska.gov</a>.
- Hunt conditions are available online at <a href="https://www.adfg.alaska.gov/index.cfm?adfg=huntlicense.cultural">www.adfg.alaska.gov/index.cfm?adfg=huntlicense.cultural</a>.
- All members of the household must be listed on the household application and all members are bound by the hunt conditions for the duration of the two-year commitment.
- Incomplete applications will be considered invalid.
