DEVELOPING SUSTAINABLE SALMON FISHERIES FOR ALASKA AND THE WORLD

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<u>Photo 1:</u> The typical amount of entangled snagging hooks retrieved by PWSAC hatchery staff during the annual post-season barrier net weir cleaning (includes whole hooks and damaged parts & pieces) – 9/19/2013.



<u>Photo 2:</u> Examples of injured Main Bay Hatchery sockeye salmon that are required to be culled from the broodstock to comply with the ADF&G Sockeye Salmon Culture Protocol. Note the long flesh gashes in the bellies and sides of the fish caused by the weighted treble hook jerked sharply via sport fishing rod & reel.



<u>Photo 3:</u> Demonstrated successful use (>15 years) of a cork/buoy-line marker placed seaward of the barrier net weir to preserve functionality and prevent damage and sport fishing inside of the broodstock holding area. The cork/buoy-line marker was removed shortly after this photo was taken as per the request from the Alaska Department of Public Safety based on a complaint that PWSAC was blocking access to an area open to sport fishing.



<u>Photo 4.</u> View of broodstock holding area from the hatchery shoreline. Boats tied to the cork/buoy-line marker.
