Ernie Weiss-I am expecting Buck Laukitis to call in, he has a proposal for the P-Cod Meeting, that he was interested in advocating, I am more interested in what you guys have to say, and follow your lead. Tom- Ernie, has there been other meeting from other area advisory meetings? Ernie- King Cove, not until sometime before the February meeting, and I am not sure what Sand Point was going to do. Do not think the other AC meeting are going to having a meeting before the P-Cod Meeting, besides you guys. Tom Hoblet-Doesn't King Cove have proposals in, and not meeting before the P-Cod Nov/Dec meeting? Ernie- that is what Grant told me, he is back in DC now. Liza Mack- Ernie is correct there are not any plans, to have a meeting in King Cove before the P Cod Meeting. I am here to follow your lead, I am still learning.

VIII. New Business: Tom Hoblet- Since our last P-Cod meeting 3 years ago, Mark do you have the numbers of what was caught inside State waters, in the last 3 years, since we put the proposal in to increase the quota? Mark- Parallel and state waters? Tom-Yes. Mark- 2013 total harvest in parallel and state waters was 25 Million Pounds, or 40.3% of the Western Gulf ABC, in 2014 the harvest was 33.7 million pounds or 46.7% of the Western Gulf ABC, I don't have the 2015, because they are still fishing. I would anticipate they would be in line with these numbers, In the last 10 years, it is right at 45% of the Western Gulf ABC. Low is 37% in 2007 and the high is 54% in 2011. Seems to be in line with your request of proposals 10 and 11.

NOTICE OF RESOLUTION BY THE CHIGNIK ADVISORY COMMITTEE (RESOLUTION NO. 2015-001)

To all whom it may concern including the Alaska Board of Fisheries and the Alaska Department of Fish and Game (ADF&G):

1. The Chignik Advisory Committee (AC) hereby serves notice that it most strongly supports the transfer of Area L salmon management from the Alaska Department of Fish and Game's Westward Region to the department's Central Region. The basis for such is grounded on a multitude of biological, social-economic, and cultural reasons including those specified in the recent Governor's petition calling for the same.

and

2. The Chignik AC also requests that ADF&G manage Chignik's two sockeye runs beginning in 2016 for a minimum escapement of female sockeye salmon in the early run (Black Lake fish) and likewise in the late run (Chignik Lake fish). The Chignik AC findings and those reported by world class fisheries scientist are that best management practices and common logic conforms to ensuring that salmon escapements are managed for an appropriate (minimum) number of females. The targeting of a generic escapement goal, absent of defined criteria for ensuring a specific female component, is unacceptable knowing that in some years too few females return and an overabundance of one-ocean fish and other age males may occur (e.g. 2015) and that salmon reproduction potential is grounded on female fecundity and their abundance.

Lastly, notice is given that the above two requests align with the Alaska Sustainable Fisheries Policy.

Subject: Comments from the Unalaska / Dutch Harbor Advisory Committee meeting held on August 29, 2015 in Unalaska, AK for Proposals included in the Alaska Board Fisheries Alaska Peninsula/Bering Sea-Aleutian Islands/Chignik Finfish meeting to be held on February 23, 2016 in Anchorage AK.

Proposal 188 – 5 AAC 12.320 South Alaska Peninsula Salmon Post June Management Plan. Establish open commercial salmon fishing periods in the Unalaska District that coincide with the last two open fishing periods in July in the Shumagin Islands Section. Motion to support Proposal 188 made by Good and seconded by Mahoney. Discussion: The committee stated its concern that the Pink salmon opening requested could potentially open without an aerial survey on the Pink salmon stock. The lack of ADFG salmon staff in the Unalaska area and the lack of information on the Pink salmon run strength were also pointed out, and for those reasons there wasn't support for this proposal. Motion failed 0/9.

Proposal 195 – 5 AAC 28.640 Aleutian Islands District and Western District of the South Alaska Peninsula Area Sablefish Management Plan. Update logbook requirements for Aleutian Islands state-waters sablefish fishery. Motion to support made by Good and seconded by Shockley. Discussion: This proposed came from ADFG staff. There was no concern from the committee and was viewed as a housekeeping issue. Motion passed 9/0.

Proposal 196 – 5 AAC 27.655 Dutch Harbor Food and Bait Herring Fishery. Change the date fishermen using purse seine gear can access the Dutch Harbor food and bait fishery gillnet allocation from July 25th to July 20th. Motion to support made by Mahoney and seconded by Good. Discussion: The discussions centered on the local entry-level gillnet fishermen that may want to fish herring in the Unalaska Bay area in the future, if the resource were available in the Unalaska Bay area. We heard testimony from one AC member that the Unalaska local small boat harvesters may need up to July 25th to harvest the gillnet allocation if it is in the local area. There was little support by the Unalaska AC to support the roll over on July 20th to the seine fleet. Motion failed 1/8.

Proposal 199 – 5 AAC 65.020 Bag Limits, possession limits, annual limits, and size limits for Alaska Peninsula and Aleutian Islands Area. Amend the freshwater bag limit provision for salmon species (other than King Salmon). Motion to support made by Good and seconded by Gregory. Discussion: Committee members indicated a concern about local salmon stocks being exploited and possibly over harvested. The lack of an ADFG salmon biologist in the community was also pointed out, along with the fact that there is little information of the strength of the

salmon stocks. There is also a lack of good information on the amount of annually harvested salmon locally. The majority of the committee felt that Proposal 199 wasn't a good fit for this area and wanted to be more conservation on the amount of resource taken in this area and felt that there are too many unknowns on the strength resource. Motion failed 3/5

Proposal 201 - 5 AAC 65.020 Bag Limits, possession limits, annual limits, and size limits for Alaska Peninsula and Aleutian Islands Area. Reduce the possession limit for Coho salmon in Illiuliuk Creek. An amended proposal was made by Gregory and seconded by Good. This proposal was made by ADFG to reduce current possession limits from 4 Coho down to 2 Coho. AC discussion showed great concern about the stock of Coho in Illiuliuk Creek and the amount of sportfish effort on these stocks. It was pointed out by committee member Gregory that the Unalaska High school hatchery program does have some Coho return numbers to the Illiuliuk River and that ADFG staff should review this information. The amended motion was to reduce bag limits down to 1 Coho per day and possession limits to 1 Coho. The amended motion passed 8/0.

VI. ADF&G Staff Updates

Sands, Com Fish Nushagak & Togiak districts, outlined projects cut July 1, 2015, Igushik and Togiak Towers. Kept them running in 2015 with special funding. Sands said his priority is to have towers; it's one of our important tasks it to count fish. Outlined plans for cost recovery fishery for next year and outlined history of cost recovering in Bristol Bay. There was a long discussion on this system. Some present expressed dislike for this program, others asked how to participate. One person noted that we had Togiak Tower before we had oil money, we should keep it.

Bob Murphy, Com Fish Port Moller, North Peninsula biologist, operates 4 weirs on North Peninsula rivers, budget cuts may lose one weir, already has lost some sampling and office staff. Otherwise no new information to provide.

VII. New Business:

A. Introductions and invitation to comment.

Verner Wilson announced he is the new BBNA Natural Resources Director. Verner grew up in Dillingham and fishes commercially each summer but has worked away from Dillingham for several years.

Gene Sandone, consultant for BBEDC provided a report on genetics studies of the Outer Port Heiden fishery for 2014, 2015 funded by the agency: Boatright et al. 2016 [full citation below]. He provided a brief summary and discussed main findings - a very large proportion (82% to 90%) of the commercial catch in this area is on Bristol Bay bound salmon. He also provided a file with BBEDC's review of proposals, their position, and where available the ADFG position.

Proposal review began in the BOF Book Page xxv, #22 & 23 - see form below.

Comments:



First need to be certain the problem is really erosion. Some issues may actually be the result of inaccurate or sloppy location of boundaries. One of the problems that has come before the Board may be more a result of accidental or inadvertent moving of the line.

Needs more work at the committee of the whole (BOF).

Igusihik beach set netters are seeing problems like those that are before the board now.

Need to establish Historical Use as a top priority in these criteria. #'s 2, 6, 7 seem to emphasize historical priority.

Appreciate the draft criteria but it needs more work.

There was some confusion among those present as to how the Advisory Committee was expected to respond to it.

How will the BOF receive comments?

How will BOF make use of these comments?

Some folks present think the BOF hopes to use the draft as a framework to adopt a policy or regulation which could then be used to address the proposals that precipitated this draft.

One commenter was concerned how close will the BOF be able to follow this or any policy they adopt?

Several comments to the effect that they don't see this draft as fixing anything.

It won't improve the rigor or accuracy of ADFG marking or setting boundaries - that's what's needed to solve some of these problems and prevent future ones. The commenter cited a situation a few years ago where DNR came out, identified boundaries for several adjoining sites (apparently requiring some shifting of anchors and gear). But that next winter these site holders were contacted by DNR and informed that DNR had used the wrong "Datum" and boundaries may be wrong and would have to be relocated again next season. (BOF may need to get briefed on issues with GPS datum errors.)

Its a place to start but I don't see people coming to agreements through it - needs work.

#3 isn't likely at all in many cases. Seems impossible. (Point made by several commenters).

#8 could be very difficult.

I think some prioritization of the criteria is needed.

5 AAC 09.365. South Unimak and Shumagin Islands June Salmon Management

<u>Plan</u>

- (a) The South Unimak and Shumagin Islands June fisheries harvest both sockeye salmon and chum salmon in a mixed stock fishery during the month of June. The sockeye salmon are predominantly Bristol Bay and Alaska Peninsula origin. The chum salmon are bound for a number of areas, including Japan, Russia, the Arctic-Yukon-Kuskokwim, Bristol Bay, the Alaska Peninsula, and southcentral Alaska. These salmon stocks have historically been harvested along the south Alaska Peninsula during the month of June. This management plan is intended to be consistent with the Policy for the Management of Sustainable Salmon Fisheries (5 AAC 39.222) and the Policy for the Management of Mixed Stock Salmon Fisheries (5 AAC 39.220).
- (b) The South Unimak fishery takes place in the Unimak District, the Southwestern District, the East Pavlof Bay and the West Pavlof Bay Sections of the South Central District, and the Bechevin Bay Section of the Northwestern District.
- (c) The Shumagin Islands fishery takes place in the Shumagin Islands Section.
- (d) In the South Unimak and Shumagin Islands fisheries, the commissioner may establish, by emergency order, commercial fishing periods as follows:
- (1) for set gillnet gear,
- (A) beginning June 7, commercial fishing periods will begin at 6:00 a.m. and run 88 hours until 10:00 p.m. three days later; commercial fishing will then close for 32 hours and reopen at 6:00 a.m. two days later;
- (B) notwithstanding (A) of this paragraph, the final commercial fishing period will end at 10:00 p.m. on June 29;
- (2) for seine and drift gillnet gear,
- (A) beginning June 10, commercial fishing periods will begin at 6:00 a.m. and run 88 hours until 10:00 p.m. three days later; commercial fishing will than close for 32 hours and reopen at 6:00 a.m. two days later;
- (B) notwithstanding (A) of this paragraph, the final commercial fishing period will end at 10:00 p.m. on June 28.
- (e) All salmon caught by a CFEC permit holder must be retained, and each CFEC permit holder must report the number of salmon caught, including those taken but not sold, on an ADF&G fish ticket. For the purposes of this subsection, "caught" means brought on board the vessel.

(d) In years when a harvestable surplus beyond the escapement goals for the first and second runs of Chignik River system sockeye salmon is expected to be more than 600,000 and the department determines that the runs are as strong as expected, the department shall manage the fishery so that the number of sockeye salmon taken in the East Stepovak, Stepovak Flats, Southwest Stepovak, Balboa Bay, and Beaver Bay Sections, and before July 1 in the Northwest Stepovak Section, approaches as near as possible six percent of the total Chignik sockeye salmon catch.

(e) Beginning July 1, the fishing schedule in the Northwest Stepovak Section, excluding Orzinski Bay north of a line from Elephant Point at 55° 41.92′ N. lat., 160° 03.20′ W. long. to Waterfall Point at 55° 43.18′ N. lat., 160° 01.13′ W. long. may not be more than four 24-hour periods with no more than 48-hours continuous fishing during a seven-day period.

(f) The estimate of sockeye salmon destined for the Chignik River has been determined to be 80 percent of the sockeye salmon harvested in the East Stepovak, Stepovak Flats, Southwest Stepovak, Balboa Bay, and Beaver Bay Sections, and before July 1 in the Northwest Stepovak Section. Beginning July 1, all sockeye salmon taken in the Northwest Stepovak Section are considered to be destined for Orzinski Bay.

(g) The total Chignik sockeye salmon catch constitutes those sockeye salmon caught within the Chignik Area, plus 80 percent of the sockeye salmon caught in the East Stepovak, Stepovak Flats, Southwest Stepovak, Balboa Bay, and Beaver Bay Sections, and before July 1 in the Northwest Stepovak Section, plus 80 percent of the sockeye salmon caught in the Cape Igvak Section of the Kodiak Area. The percentage of Chignik sockeye salmon may be permitted to fluctuate above or below six percent at any time before July 25.

(h) The allocation method described in (a)—(g) of this section is in effect through July 25. The commissioner may not open the first fishing period of the commercial salmon fishing season in the East Stepovak, Southwest Stepovak, Balboa Bay, and Beaver Bay Sections, and before July 1 in the Northwest Stepovak Section, before the first fishing period of the commercial salmon fishing season in the Chignik Area. After July 25, the commissioner may open, by emergency order, commercial salmon fishing in the entire Southeastern District Mainland area for local stocks.

(i) During the period from approximately June 26 through July 8, the strength of the second run of the Chignik River system sockeye salmon cannot be

evaluated. In order to prevent overharvest of the second run, the department may disallow or severely restrict commercial salmon fishing in the East Stepovak, Stepovak Flats, Southwest Stepovak, Balboa Bay, and Beaver Bay Sections during this period, and from June 26 through June 30 in the Northwest Stepovak Section.

(j) The commissioner shall open all commercial fishing periods by emergency order. Before commencement of the first commercial salmon fishing period of the season, the department shall give at least 24 hours' notice. For subsequent fishing periods, the department shall give at least 12 hours' notice. If an existing fishing period is extended, the department shall give notice of the extension as soon as possible before the end of the existing fishing period. 5 AAC 09.365. SOUTH UNIMAK AND SHUMAGIN ISLANDS JUNE SALMON MAN-AGEMENT PLAN. (a) The South Unimak and Shumagin Islands June fisheries harvest both sockeye salmon and chum salmon in a mixed stock fishery. These stocks of salmon are bound for Bristol Bay and the Arctic-Yukon-Kuskokwim region, as well as other areas across the North Pacific Ocean. These salmon stocks have historically been intercepted in significant numbers along the Alaska Peninsula. To ensure that none of these salmon stocks are overharvested, it is necessary to restrain the interception of these stocks as provided in the management plan in this section, and consistent with the Policy for the Management of Sustainable Salmon Fisheries (5 AAC 39.222) and Policy for the Management of Mixed Stock Salmon Fisheries (5 AAC 39.220).

(b) The South Unimak fishery takes place in the Unimak District, the Ikatan Bay Section in the Southwestern District, and the Bechevin Bay Section in the Northwestern District, plus the following waters of the Southwestern District located outside of the Ikatan Bay Section and not described as closed waters in 5 AAC 09.350;

(1) waters north and west of a line from Cape Pankof Light to Thin Point (54° 57.32′ N. lat., 162° 33.50′ W. long.); and

(2) waters enclosed by a line from Thin Point (54° 57.32′ N. lat., 162° 33.50′ W. long.) to the northernmost tip of Stag Point (54° 59.10′ N. lat., 162° 18.10′ W. long.) on Deer Island to the southernmost tip of Dolgoi Cape (55° 03.15′ N. lat., 161° 44.35′ W. long.) on Dolgoi Island and from the northernmost tip of Bluff Point (55° 09.93′ N. lat., 161° 53.72′ W. long.) on Dolgoi Island to Arch

Point Light (55° 12.30' N. lat., 161° 54.30' W. long.).

(c) The Shumagin Islands fishery takes place in the Shumagin Islands Section.

(d) Beginning June 10, the commissioner may open, by emergency order, commercial fishing periods for purse seine and drift gillnet gear as follows:

(1) commercial fishing periods may occur only from 6:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. and may not be open

for more than

(A) three days in any seven-day period;

(B) 16 hours per day;

(C) 48 hours in any seven-day period;

(D) two consecutive 16-hour fishing periods in any seven-day period;

(2) through June 24, commercial fishing periods in the Shumagin Islands and South Unimak fisheries will occur at the same time;

(3) after June 24, the provisions of (f) apply.e) Beginning June 10, the commissioner m

(e) Beginning June 10, the commissioner may open, by emergency order, commercial fishing periods for set gillnet gear in both the South Unimak and Shumagin Islands fisheries as follows:

(1) from June 10 through June 24,

(A) commercial fishing periods may occur

only from 6:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.;

(B) the fishery will be closed for one period if, during the preceding period, the ratio of sockeye salmon to chum salmon is not equal to or greater than the recent 10 year average;

(2) after June 24, the schedule of openings and closings of fishing periods shall coincide with the schedule for seine and drift gillnet gear as specified in (f) of this section.

(f) After June 24, in either the South Unimak or

Shumagin Islands fisheries,

(1) if the ratio of sockeye salmon to chum salmon is two to one or less on any day, the next daily fishing period for seine and drift gillnet gear shall be of six-hour duration in that fishery;

(2) if the ratio of sockeye salmon to chum salmon is greater than two to one, the commissioner may extend the fishing period by emergency order, to a maximum of 16 hours as described in (d)(1) of this section;

(3) if the ratio of sockeye salmon to chum salmon is two to one or less for two consecutive fishing periods, the fishery shall close for all gear

types.

harvest areas, and to establish fishing periods for the South Alaska Peninsula salmon fisheries outside of terminal harvest areas.

(b) The commissioner shall establish, to the ex-

tent practicable, concurrent fishing periods in the

Southeastern, South Central, Southwestern, and Unimak Districts.

(c) Fishing periods may be established under this section only as follows:

(1) except as specified in (d), for July, from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.;

(2) for August, from 8:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.;

(3) for September, from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.; and

(4) for October, from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

(d) Notwithstanding (c)(1) of this section, the commissioner may establish, by emergency order, six 24-hour fishing periods interspersed by 48 hour closures from July 6 through July 21, and three 36-hour fishing periods interspersed by 48 hour closures from July 22 through July 31. The first commercial fishing period of the July 22 through July 31 period may not start before 12:00 noon on July 23.

(e) From July 22 through July 31, no more than 60,000 coho salmon may be taken in the entire South Alaska Peninsula, except in those areas designated as terminal harvest areas specified in (f) and

(g) of this section.

(f) The commissioner may open, by emergency order, the following terminal harvest areas to salmon fishing from July 6 through July 21:

(1) the Shumagin Islands Section of the Southeastern District, waters of Zachary Bay south of the latitude of 55° 22.60' N. lat.; fishing periods shall be established based on the abundance of pink and chum salmon stocks:

A meeting of the subcommittee with be scheduled to take place at the Sheraton before/during the BOF scheduled meeting.

Melvin commented that WASSIP showed that the interception harvest rate is low. We are not a growing fishery. The state of Alaska has a mixed-stock policy that addresses fisheries such as ours. Data shows that reds caught in Area M were of a larger size than fish caught in adjacent areas.

With the 8% quota, is there a way to have an adjustable weight limit for the winter like we do for the summer? I think we need to think about how to control the number of permits out there.

Charlie Lean: Explains the need to reduce and address the pot loss.

Frank McFarlan: A crew of four doesn't need to have 80 pots. I just see people buying more permits. I don't think we want more permits out there.

It was recommended to get the proposal in place and see how it goes for a couple of years and see if there were modifications required at that point.
