VII. Reports

- a. Chair's report: Kevin Taylor asked Georgina Heaverly to give a report on the recent Board of Fish meeting in Cordova. She had given testimony on behalf of the Anchorage AC. The bulk of the meeting was around coupling commercial and sport fishing regulations, guiding in subsistence use areas, and crab harvesting. The most recent Board of Fish member recently resigned. The SE and Yakutat finfish and crab meeting was cancelled due to COVID-19.
- b. ADF&G: Dave Battle gave an update on the moose biopsy project and aerial moose counts. The Department was able to fly this year more than they have in the last 12 years. All counts and drainages have more moose in them compared to the last time they were surveyed. This may affect permit numbers depending on the final statistics. On JBER, preliminary counts are around 400 moose. The Anchorage moose count was completed this year and may be repeated in the future pending funding. Biopsy samples were taken opportunistically by darting, through the permit harvests and the roadkill moose. There are several years of data to run statistics on. **Preliminarily** there are at least 350 moose in the

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Anchorage bowl.

Minutes from last meeting were unanimously approved.

Guest speaker Ed Holsten discussed trap setbacks on federal land being rejected. Holsten also stated the Federal Regional Advisory Committee (RAC) would like to see more written proposals from local residents and local Advisory Committees (AC). Holsten discussed the last round of proposals were accepted with addendums added to all of them.

Elections were held for three AC positions. Josh Hayes was elected as Chairman John Pearson was elected as Vice Chairman Billy Coullete was elected onto the board.

First topic of discussion was Proposal 141. Black Bear stations being one-mile apart. The AC voted unanimously to oppose this proposal. The regulation did not seem applicable for Unit Seven and Unit 15 due to current laws and terrain, as well as current land ownership.



Next topic of discussion was Proposal Eight. A shortened trapping season on coyotes in central and south-central Alaska. The AC voted unanimously in favor of this proposal. It will align the trapping seasons and our main concerns were the road-accessible areas. There is less confusion when seasons are aligned.

The next agenda item was Proposal 198. No bear-bait stations within 50 miles of a cabin. The AC unanimously opposed this regulation because there is no science-based justification for the law. It seems this proposal may have been generated by individuals who are anti-bear baiting.

Board of Fish Proposal 238 was discussed. It would set netters to put their nets within six hundred feet from the mouth of Kenai River if an escapement of 13,500 king salmon was met. The AC unanimously opposed this proposal because this law would affect not only the Kenai River but all of the tributary that drain into the Kenai River. There are indirect implications to the Coho fishery. This proposal was brought to the table on an off year out of the normal cycle which decreases public input and conflicts with paired restrictions. It directly conflicts with the late-season king salmon management plan. Set nets have a substantial bycatch of king salmon and coho salmon. This law would be passed on the lowest of escapement goals which leads to poor biological management and even worse conservation practices. We believe this proposal may be due to last year's larger sockeye escapement. We also believe this is not a good reason to make changes based on just one year of sockeye escapement data. The Cooper Landing community believes there is a lack of knowledge on the Kenai River's carrying capacity.

As the board's regulatory authority covers state authorized hunts, there is questionable legal validity for the board to place limits on federal subsistence hunt opportunities for which they have no legal control. It would be beyond "the scope of authority conferred" (Chapter 62. Administrative Procedures Act, Sec. 44.62.020, Authority to adopt, administer, or enforce regulations). For the department's interpretation to be valid and enforceable, it seems that the board would need the authority to regulate federal subsistence hunt opportunities; this authority would need to be delegated by the Federal Subsistence Board. The current interpretation by the department leads to confusion, may lead to unwarranted citations, legal liability, and future law suits, and also seems arbitrary in nature. The purpose of the regulation was to reduce overcrowding and excessive pressure on the resources. Currently, a lim






Department/AWT Update: Christy Gleason – introduction of new staff, Shane Ransbury, commercial fisheries.

Tony H: finished 20A moose survey Sunday, quite challenging with weather, snowing or really cold or windy. Like to cut off moose surveys by Dec 5th due to bulls dropping antlers. Had to extend time this year, haven't run numbers yet, possible lower bull:cow ratio. Will bring #s to the Jan. meeting. Minto Flats MGMT area cow hunt still open, 7 taken so far, quota is 15. Slower this year.

Kirk: is there a correction factor for doing later survey due to bulls dropping antlers?

Tony: Not really, won't feel as confident with later survey as to # of bulls. Good portion was before antlers were being dropped. Still get good idea of what's going on.

Katie Sechrist – Wildlife Conservation Hunter Access Program update: couple projects in the area, one in particular is construction project to replace Fortune Creek bridge on Cache Creek rd. Matt Stevens here from Forestry (collaborator). Starting in May will do large P-R access project. Start in May, replace bridge, road improvements. Ideally be out end of August in time for fall hunting season. Million



dollar plus project. Will get word out, spread the news to bear baiters/hunters.

Levi: is this Dept generated or did it come from the public?

Katie: Dept generated in collaboration with Forestry, been on books for a while.

Kramer: Have used Cache creek road for a while, in past have been maintained and funded by Forestry, because of logging. Glad ADFG is involved, but why isn't Forestry funding it?

Katie: Good question, it is a state forestry road, understand that forestry doesn't have adequate funds, came up with match with forestry. Forestry staff involved and committed to maintaining road long term.

Al: glad we can use P-R funds for this, and it's why we should be able to use D-J funds for Chitina dipnet projects.

Bill Larry: what is projected life of new bridge?

Katie: Think it is 20 years but should last longer

Chris Stark (board of forestry, represents environmental side). Lots of hunters use that road. Upgrades happen when Forestry gets funds. Forestry can't do much road stuff, and bridge was toast. Thankful that ADFG jumped in to help using P-R funds. Katie: one other update on education and safety improvements at South Cushman rifle range. That is moving fwd and on track, will be constructed this summer. Facility will be closed, hopefully open in August. Large million dollar project.

Kirk: glad to see that happen, important facility for hunters.

Katie: application period open, let us know of any access needs.

Matt Stevens: Fbks/Delta forester, not a whole lot to add. Value of timber limiting factor in funding improvements to forestry roads. About 300 miles of forestry road to maintain, any help we can get is much appreciated.

Introduction of new members, Austin Smith and Bill Larry:

Bill Larry: owner of Alaska Fun Center, been on AC a long time, also a trapper. Interests in hatchery issues

Austin Smith: originally from Tennessee, stationed at Ft Greely, wants to get involved more in issues.

Fisheries Issues: Gale Vick: Does everyone have a copy of BOF summary? [was passed around] We went through all the proposals the AC had supported, vs the ones we opposed. Spoke about those actions at BOF meeting. Mackenzie Mitchell here tonight to answer any questions. Chuck/John do you have questions for Mackenzie?

Chuck: proposal 18, extend boundary of lower district. CDA supported your appointment to BOF, so did AC. We (CDA) submitted one proposal to BOF to benefit fishery. You voted no, reasoning was it dealt with safety issue, congestion of boats, reasoning I heard was confusing, not what proposal was about. Alleviate congestion was purpose of proposal. Amended proposal twice with 2 RCs, so it would have better chance of passing. Very disappointed.

Mackenzie: sorry to disappoint you, proposal was written to remedy danger and congestion, when I spoke with Sommerville, he didn't believe it would alleviate the



problem. Way proposal was written, don't understand the congestion or danger issue when you can continue to drift...seems more allocative in time and area. Concurred with Dept and Troopers.

Chuck: Sommerville refuted by Klaus...

Discussion...

Al: I found it hard too to see how it was allocative

Jeff Lucas: have drifted that area, one of the safety concerns was when we hit markers we were done and went back up to drift again.

Kirk: never dipped out of a boat down there.

Gale: thanks Mackenzie for her service, important as we go into AYK proposals to have conversations with her. Lots of issues about food security, thanks Mackenzie for comments on prop 19. Mackenzie, any questions to us?

Mackenzie: more than happy to speak to anyone re the Cordova BOG meeting, just trying to make myself available to answer questions.

Kramer: Cordova not a fair place for meeting, too many commercial interests Virgil: question whether any staff or hatchery admin said about my proposals? Mackenzie: one proposal addressed something said at prior meeting, consensus was there was no proof of Virgil's claim.

Siegfried: want to touch on something. Most of CDA actions were addressed by Chuck, goes into what Kramer said about meeting in Cordova. As observer at meeting, where it went foul was one commercial fisherman after another lined up at committee of whole saying same talking points, three days into meeting we were a day behind. Other thing I noticed, safe line at meeting...when board member gets across that line they are surrounded, usually by comm fishermen. Mackenzie very rarely came across that line.

Gale: few comments on discussion, one other contention meeting in Cordova is cost to get there, other board members complained that proposers were not at meeting to speak to their proposals. And they would not weigh them as much because of no shows. One board member was not even there, even via teleconference. We should address the BOF with comments, never seen this a meeting before. Does not encourage trust from public.

Asking Mackenzie if she is comfortable speaking about research committee. Mackenzie: live in Fbks, happy to meet with any of you any time. Re research committee, now chair of that committee, trying to get some research projects going, working with ACs and stakeholders and others, perhaps get BOF to go on record endorse on projects.

Gale: roundatable summit on AYK salmon issues, big issue is funding for research. What can board do vs what they can't do re research and funding? Would like to invite Mackenzie to fisheries subcommittee meetings.

Kirk: heard a news spot about roundtable summit, Russian salmon issues, hatcheries in Russia

Gale: Joint Technical Committee for Yukon river panel. Will let Chris speak to that Chris Stark: on the JTC, working on reconfiguring escapement goal for Canada, was set at 45K in 2007. Presently the project is in Canadian hands, modeling to make



projections. New model will not tell panel what that # should be. Panel will pick "risk factors," guess is we will be where we were before, amazing uncertainty on salmon stocks in western Alaska. Don't expect tremendous change in border passage escapement goal.

Gale: work for JTC is for Canadian bound fish.

Chris: what is important is what is returning to the U.S. from Canada. Goal for panel will just be Canadian escapement

Date for next panel meeting is January 22-27, 2022.

Gale: Stan Zuray report on ichthyophonous to subcommittee. High percentage of Ich in salmon this year. Waiting for results from Rapid Research Center.

Deena Jallen: samples from last season studied, still don't know things about Ich, how lethal is it, how prevalent is it upriver, where does mortality occur...plans to study it more.

Virgil: in 1999 Doyon wanted 30 king salmon filleted from District 5, fish were bad, many had Ich, you can tell when filleting if it's bad, looks like pockets of pus all through fillet against backbone, has weird smell, have cooked some of it and it tastes horrible. Have found Ich in copper river fish, Dillingham, in different species of fish. Comes from eating infected herring. Research, however, showed no infected herring in Bering Sea, so salmon must be going south past AK peninsula to eat herring.

Gale: BOF hatchery meeting coming in March, one-day meeting, not regulatory. Will be working on a lot of comments to bring to AC for Jan. meeting so we can get out on-time comments for the board.

Kirk: comments for Hatchery meeting due Feb 3rd (??)

Gale: also have AYK cycle coming up, proposals due April 11th. Will have new fisheries calendar at next meeting. Will get out minutes from last subcommittee meeting. Set date for next subcommittee meeting: Monday Jan. 10th in person/hybrid 6:30pm location TBD

Discussion on location for future meetings, larger venue that F&G conference room.

State CSH system developed by efforts from Ahtna villages, open to all AK residents, AHTNA wants to address their own needs. Understand why your AC doesn't support CSH system. Twelve voters present. Six votes for Tracy, six votes for Alexie. Tie settled by a dice roll; Tracy wins the seat.

VI. A.D.F.G staff updates

T. Oconner-Brito (board support): Board of Game scheduled to meet 1/21. They have decided to postpone regional and statewide in person meetings, further dates TBD.



They also have shown concern about regional and statewide meetings conducted by other means such as Zoom. The Board of Fish has also postponed regional and statewide meetings.

Dave Crowley (Wildlife Biologist): Moose: local GMUs show steady although rather low calf/cow ratios. There were fewer moose hunters in the field (possibly Covid related) but the success rate was up considerably. There appears to be a healthy bull population for the local hunters in 9c. GMU 9b has a low calf survival rate with the suspected cause being high predation by both bear and wolf.

Bear: Stream surveys good cub production numbers. The last harvest and hunter effort numbers are at a historical low for both resident and non-resident hunters.

Todd Rinaldi (Regional Management Coordinator): Currently there is no area biologist in Dillingham. A candidate has been selected but timing is delayed due to the pandemic.

Caribou: An aerial survey was conducted for the Mulchatna herd including the numerous satellite herds. They were able to locate 67/69 tracking collars implying an accurate survey. A photo census was also conducted to determine aggregation. The final data has not been consolidated so do not have accurate numbers to report for calf/cow and bull/cow numbers.

Wolf/predator control program will be active again. The predator control program was a success last year, with a harvest of about 60 animals and resulted in an improved calf survival rate. SDA teams will now have to contact the Palmer office for information, no longer King Salmon office.

RM585 (supplemental winter moose hunt) in GMU 17b and 17c will not be open this year due to very low calf survival rate.

Travis Elison (Comm Fish Biologist): Update for the 2020 BBay commercial salmon season. 2020 saw a very large return and harvest bay wide with a total run of 58.9 million, a catch of 40 million, and a total escapement of 18.9 million. The Naknek River saw a record-breaking total run and escapement. The Egegik River also saw a notably above average return. Both the Egegik and Kvichak Rivers are seeing a decline of two year freshwater fish which in the past was a large portion of the return. They are coming back instead as 1-2s or 1-3s. Processors were frequently strained and unable to keep up with the catch due to Covid and the result was limited fishing opportunity. The 2021 season is forecasted to be yet another strong year. Travis states that he believes we are potentially past the peak of this multi-year high production regime.



VII. Comments

Public: Heidi Kritz (BBNA), BBNA has sent out a request to Iliamna area villages seeking information on the Iliamna Lake seal harvest. She/they are looking for willing participants in each village to help with gathering information about seal harvest in the lake. Please forward information to Heidi if the AC can recommend people involved in the harvest.

AC members: Randy Alverez voiced concern over a lack of rainbow trout being harvested by ice fishing in the Kvichak drainage and hopes ADFG can look into it. ADFG had hoped to do a creel survey but did not do one on the Kvichak River or the Iliamna River. A survey was done on the Naknek River.

Tinny Hedlund stated that there is a noticeable decline of larger char on the Iliamna River. It seems that large char is now only found ten miles or farther up the river. It seems to Tinny that the lack of char corresponds with an abundance of seal in the river. Has talked to witnesses of seals taking lots of char. We need to do something about the growing seal numbers.

I. Central/Southwest B.O.G. proposals:

Proposal#s 2,4,5, regarding the harvest of sheep by bow. No Comment.

Proposal 6, Brown bear tag fee exemption. Proposed by A.D.F.G. Moved to Adopt by W. Hill, Second by K. Jensen. Vote to support passes 10/0 unanimous support.

Prop #8, Furbearer trapping. Proposed by Tom Lessard. Shorten Coyote trapping seasons in GMU 9,13,14b,16 and 17 to align with seasons for trapping other furbearers. B. Trefon moves to adopt, second by T. Hedlund. Vote to support passes 10/0 unanimous support.

Prop #s 15,16,17 Hunting season and bag limits for moose. All three proposals define registration hunts for bowhunters only. Comments: the AC fears future desire for allocation of harvest to the bowhunters. Would be difficult for ADFG to structure and manage. Move to adopt by T. Hedlund, second by B. Trefon. Vote to support fails 0/10. Unanimous opposition.

Prop #20 Hunting season and bag limits for Caribou, Priority for subsistence hunting; Tier II permits. Proposed by ADFG. The Mulchatna Caribou herd continues to struggle, and the population continues to drop. Establishing a Tier II hunt would further reduce the harvest pressure on the herd while protecting



subsistence needs. The AC supports this proposal but commented that the BOG needs to consider household/family size in the ranking process. Also, concerned that young hunters who seek to harvest for their family may not be ranked high enough to qualify. This is not great but is a better option than no harvest opportunity at all. Move to adopt by B. Tracy, second by J. Tilly. Vote to support passes 10/0. Unanimous support.

Prop #21 Intensive management plans I. Establish a second predation control area for Mulchatna caribou on federal lands in GMU 17 and 18. Proposed by ADFG. Current predator programs have been successful on nearby state lands. This will allow similar program on federal lands used by the Mulchatna caribou herd. The AC comments that it has been witnessed as a success in the area. A successful program has proven to increase calf survival rates. Move to adopt by B. Tracy, second by B. Trefon. Vote to support passes 10/0. Unanimous support.

Prop #23 Unlawful means of taking game, exceptions. Allow the use of snowmachines to position wolf or wolverine in unit 17 as follows. This proposal seeks to clarify the already allowed use of snowmachines to hunt wolf and wolverine. The current regs do not specify exactly how they may be used. This will protect the hunter from litigation and will align regulations in unit 17 with regs in other GMUs. Moved to adopt b y J. Tilly, second by B. Tracy. Vote to support passes, 10/0. Unanimous support.

Prop #41 Hunting season and bag limits for small game. Increase the number of non-resident permits for taking Emperor geese in GMUs 9,10,17. This prop is similar to Props #32-50, all of which seek to increase harvest permits for Emperor geese. The AC comments that they do not think an increase in permits is prudent as the population does not support it. AC will adopt this one prop to express the sentiment regarding all other props seeking an increase in harvest permits. Move to adopt by K. Aguiar, second by B. Trefon. Vote to support fails 0/10, unanimous opposition.

Election of Committee Members

It was moved by Eric Johnson and seconded by Dave McHoes to nominate Payton McHoes to the committee. Motion carried.

New Business

The advisory board conferenced called with James Van Lanen from Fish and Game Subsistance Division and Tim Peltier, Fish & Game Area Biologists to ask questions and convey the committee's concerns.

Dave McHoes asked Tim Peltier, the area biologist, if there is still a 100 bull permit hunt scheduled for this winter. He indicated there is. He said the last count for 16B north was around 32 or 38 bulls per 100 cows. Eric Johnson stated possibly in the south but certainly not in the north.

It was moved by Dave McHoes and seconded by Tom Brion that the Mt. Yenlo Advisory Committee adopt Proposal 84 to establish an antierless moose season in 16B. The committee felt that an antierless moose season is not advisable in 16B for the next few years until the population increases. Motion failed.

It was moved by Roger Phillips and seconded by Shon Park to amend the adoption of Proposal 84 to establish an anterless moose season after the Dept of Fish & Game can verify that the population has recovered. Motion failed.

It was moved by Dave McHoes and seconded by Roger Phillips to adopt Proposal 85 to establish a special bowhunt for moose in 16B. Dave McHoes informed the committee that bowhunters can already hunt during the general seasion. The committee felt that is sufficient. Motion failed.

It was moved by Dave McHoes and seconded by Shon Parker to adopt Proposal 92 & 93 to allow year round bear hunting. The committee felt that allowing year round hunting would not work as the brown bear population has declined and hides would not be good year round. Motion failed.



It was moved by Dave McHoes and seconded by Shon Parker to adopt Proposal 97 to allow bowhunting & rifle for beaver during trapping season. Dave McHoes informed the committee that beaver hunting is already allowed with a rifle. A discussion followed indicating the problems with shooting a beaver with a bow and retrieving the beaver. Motion failed.

It was moved by Dave McHoes and seconded by Shon Parker to adopt Proposal 100 to remove the requirements that traps and snares for beaver be submerged in Unit 16. Dave McHoes informed the committee that as the law is written that when they opened up the early season in September before the regular season opens November 10th, they made it so the traps had to be submerged. This is a totally uncompilable regulation with the river going up and down in September. Motion failed.

It was moved by Dave McHoes and seconded by Shon Parker to adopt Proposal 2 to establish a special archery season for Dall Sheep in Unit 16 and other units. Dave McHoes informed the committee that bow hunters can already hunt during the general season. Motion failed.

It was moved by Dave McHoes and seconded by Shon Parker to adopt proposal 3,4 and 5 to establish more archery seasons. Motion failed

It was moved by Dave McHoes and seconded by Shon Parker to adopt Proposition 6 to reauthorize the Fish & Game brown bear tag fee. Dave informed the committee that you used to have to pay \$25 fee. The fee was removed to make it easier to kill brown bears because we wanted to reduce the brown bear population. Dave McHoes asked the area biologists if there are units included in the proposal that still need to reduce the brown bear population. The biologists did not know. The biologists did not think there was that much revenue generated. Motion failed.

It was moved by Dave McHoes and seconded by Shon Parker to adopt Proposal 7 that would increase the limit of black bears in Unit 13B and 16B from 3 to 5. Eric Johnson felt the black bear population in Unit 16B seem to be in short supply. The committee indicated that very few hunters even get 3 a year. The committee asked the area biologists if there is any biological concern with this proposal. He indicated that very few hunters take 3 black bears and has no biological concerns. By increasing the limits, you increase interest in hunting in those areas. Motion failed.

It was moved by Dave McHoes and seconded by Shon Parker to adopt Proposal 8 to shorten the trapping season for coyotes in multiple southcentral units. The reason they expanded it was hoping it would remove some coyotes to help the sheep population. Fur quality is an issue when then are trapped early. The committee felt there are too many coyotes in the area. Dave McHoes indicated no one out here traps coyotes in September. The issue only effects Anchorage where they are abusing this opening. Motion failed.

It was moved by Dave McHoes and seconded by Shon Parker to adopt Proposal 9 extend the wolf trapping season to the end of May in Units 13 and 16. Discussion was held that the hides would not be good through May. Bears could get snared as they would be out in May. Motion failed unanimously.

It was moved by Shon Parker and seconded by Tom Brion that they adjourn the meeting at 2:05 PM. Motion carried unanimously.

VII. Reports

a. ADFG Commercial Fisheries Update AMB Tim Sands: discussed the 2020 season summary for Nushagak district. Major issue was low king salmon returns even with the extra precautions like the reduced commercial schedule. Kings are

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- approaching "Stock of Concern Status". He then discussed the 2021 forecast of 51 million sockeye bay-wide and 14.76 sockeye total return expected for the Nushagak district stocks. . King salmon returns will continue to be of great concern. There was a discussion of the process and consequences if the kings are officially declared a stock of concern. Interest was expressed for a public discussion of management pre-season.
- b. ADFG Sport Fish AMB Lee Borden: Summarized the 2020 sport fishery: effort notably reduced in June and early July. Some increase in effort for coho and rainbow trout late July and into September. Department projects were reduced or halted due to reduced anglers in the fishery and declining budges. One public comment also noted sport effort on Nushagak kings was noticeably reduced this summer due to Covid restrictions and many sport operations were curtailed or closed
- ADFG Wildlife Todd Rinaldi: Explained biologist Watine left her position in April. New area biologist Brian Riley hired for the Dillingham office; originally to arrive in November but Dillingham quarantine rules have forced postponement. Now hope to be on-site in January 2021. Mulchatna Caribou were surveyed very carefully but only 13, 500 animals estimated for entire range of herd, less than half the minimum population goal. There are some ADFG proposals designed to address concerns. Assistant Bio. Chris Peterson provided more details of caribou survey results. She is encouraged by good bull to cow ratio and young healthy bulls. 17B&C Moose population and harvest were discussed - "abysmal calf survival" apparently due to bear predation. Fall 2020 harvest was at levels similar to total annual harvest levels including winter harvests and a 2020 winter season is not justified - the bulls just aren't there". 17A moose populations appears strong hence an ADFG proposal is offered. Todd briefly described the process for requesting emergency hunts for moose and caribou in response to public comments and one Tribal Council request. Wolves were discussed briefly as well as a comment about Brown Bear baiting.
- d. ADFG Boards, Taryn O'Connor-Brito updated the AC on the meeting plans and struggles to hold Board meetings while meeting COVID concerns. There does not appear to be much support for remote regulatory meetings. Board of Game will meet for work session on January 21st to discuss possible meeting dates. She encouraged villages to update their representative elections.
- e. USFWS Togiak Refuge biologist Aderman provided updated the AC on Nushagak Peninsula caribou: Population has dropped to about 200 animals from estimate of up to 700 in 2019. 300 animals harvested in 2019-2020 hunt seems like 200 animals cannot be accounted for. Therefore fall 2020 the decision on consultation the Nushagak Caribou committee was to allow Manokotak to take 5 bulls. NO other harvest will be allowed. Moose information to be discussed during proposals.

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- f. Alaska State Troopers Wildlife, Bump: Main enforcement Wood River in-river is always a problem, some wastage of subsistence and commercial salmon. Not much sport fish enforcement as not much effort was out there. Lower effort in the herring or bear seasons, less nonresident caribou, and moose hunters. There were questions about reselling taxidermy, reports of headhunters and wastage in upper Nushagak, violations of the "sport hunting buffer", and seining salmon in the middle reaches of the Nushagak River.
- g. Bristol Bay Science and Research Inst. (BBSRI) Jeff Regnart and Michael Link: Brief discussion of the effort to revamp Nushagak chinook management plan (RC9). Expressed interest in keeping AC advised, the Board of Fish King committee was disbanded but kept working no output available yet. Michael Link was ready to discuss more on the king plan when the AC takes it up.

BBSRI may have recommendations prior to call for BOF Bristol Bay proposals closing but no promises at this time. Tim Sands warned about "side groups" that may come up with ideas that surprise public. Commercial fishermen need to know what to expect, haphazard and last minute does not work.

*** AC reached Consensus: There is a clear need to have future meetings to address these issues and to encourage maximum public participation. No group or subcommittees formed at this time.

Wildlife Food Security

ADFG Rinaldi acknowledge receipt of letter from Koliganek speaking to the need to have hunts for moose and Caribou and stating that the season closed early. Todd F noted we had neglected to allow candidates or others speak to nominations. Chair apologized for oversight. Dan spoke briefly to Kenneth's qualifications, Kenneth spoke to his interests and appreciated support of voters and his community.
Joe C moved Tom 2nd to accept Kenneth and Steve as alternates by unanimous consent. No objections. Steve Perkins was no in attendance but has served in the past.

VII. Updates

a. Chair:

Asked that updates that are not related to Wildlife be brief, that purpose of this meeting was to address wildlife proposals not considered 1 year ago and in the supplemental BOG book, and that there are quite a few to look at. She noted that another AC meeting can be planned for February 2022 to deal with fisheries and other items.

b. ADF&G:

Tim Sands Com Fish: In the interest of saving time, noted that a lot of commercial fisheries information is available on the Commercial Fisheries website. Or people may call him at the Dillingham office.

Todd Rinaldi Wildlife: discussed GMU 17 moose abundance. 17 B is huge, hard to cover and is divided into 2 parts to survey. Population objective for 17B is 4,900 to 6,000 and best current estimate is 3,000 to 3,500. Objectives may be unrealistic and set too high, but more analysis is needed. 17B harvest objective is 200-400 but the last 5 year average is 61 in the fall and this is why RM585 could be opened in 17B for the winter. 17C goal is 2,800-3,500 and currently estimated at 2,700 to 2,800 so not far below goal. The 17C harvest objective is 165-350. However not meeting harvest goals - 17C has averaged 145 animals in all recent seasons. The Dept is looking at productivity and calf survival and specific causes of mortality. Estimate survival at less than 10% - much lower than anywhere else in Alaska. Brown bears appear to be the main predator. Herd is very productive with good twin rates, but few calves make it to autumn. ADFG is doing a feasibility assessment on implementing possible management actions and options. Hopes to provide the study to the public after presenting to the BOG. Todd R was hoping to provide a hunter harvest graphic to the AC showing resident and nonresident harvest breakdown by the end of the meeting.

Chris Brockman, ADFG Wildlife joined the meeting and was introduced. 20 years' experience, trapper hunter and acting area Biologist for 17 until permanent staff is hired. The recruitment for an assistant biologist failed when the applicant declined an offer of the position. [note: Dillingham has not had a wildlife biologist in the Dillingham position for more than a few months for over 2 years.]

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AC member noted there are a LOT of brown bears in the Wood River lakes lately and asked for estimates of bear and wolf populations. Todd says no recent bear estimates have been done and last study on wolves was in 2012 estimating about 5 wolves per 1000 square Km. He noted there have been 3 years under intensive management where harvest was over 70 animals, 104 were taken in 2020 - 21. Intensive Management area has been maximized but in the future likely to be focused on the calving areas to be more efficient. Moose aren't habitat limited, good food available but looking at other intensive management options that may be extremely expensive or might not be socially acceptable. Brown bear harvest is low in 17B&C.

AC member thanked Todd R for the bear information saying there are a lot of bears in the Lake system. Do you have an estimate of bears in the area? Todd has none but looking at new techniques like hair snares, but bears seem to have increased. Todd discussed wolf collaring work in the area. We think we are meeting IM goals in the area. Wolf survey is planned for spring in 17B, C and possibly portions of 9.

Another AC member asked about bear survey times of day and techniques. Todd explained some methods and acknowledged counting bears is extremely difficult. He encouraged people to share their observations.

AC member noted that with these huge all-time high red runs likely supporting a fast growing bear population. Noted sows appear to be successfully bringing litters of 3 and 4 cubs through winters.

This member also asked about the frequency and numbers harvested of Ceremonial/Funerary moose and caribou hunts in GMU 17. Todd R explained the process for 17 (a call-in process) and that there were about 7 such hunts last year in 17.

AC member asked how much sport effort has been on harvesting bears. Todd R: sport effort and harvest are low, very few people take 2 bears. Nonresidents must register. One challenge to manage bears is few folks want to harvest 1 bear let alone take 2 per year. Trying to look at ways to encourage more harvest of bears. AC member said it's a good idea to get more sport harvest bears.

AC member asked about meaning of "socially unacceptable harvest of bears" Todd said not much can be done. This feasibility study is about exploring beyond sport harvest to removal of bears under Intensive Management or under predator control. Might investigate ways to harvest more bears. Maybe baiting and other methods that might be used. Todd noted this may concern some people. May have to have Department remove bears which can get extremely expensive and raise public concerns.

AC member went on to outline the problems of selling a bear hide even though GMU 17 regulations allow it. Taxidermists are afraid to deal with the hides due to the hassles. Maybe some regulation language could be improved. Rinaldi outlined some limitations on sale - might only be able to be sold once. That prevents a taxidermist from re-selling the bear. Brockman substantiated that regulatory situation.

c. Other

USFWS Togiak Refuge:

Biologist Andy Aderman: Gave a brief outline off 17A Moose. 2019 survey shows about 2,000 moose and above goal, hope to do another survey in 2022, excellent calf production, 70% twinning, only 11% survival to November, harvest increased to an all-time high. 20-21 - 164 harvest above 108 moose in 19-20. This strong harvest should help get population closer to ideal levels.

Nushagak Peninsula Caribou, 2021 survey counted 258 animals and estimated 287 +/- 47 while 202 estimate was 226 +/- 41. Caribou committee met and recommended issuing 4 harvest permits all to Manokotak. No animals reported taken yet this year. Andy expects the caribou will be shared throughout the village when they are caught.

BBNA:


Gayla Hoseth, BBNA Natural Resources Director, introduced new staff Renee Roque and announced Tribal travel funds are available for BOG meeting. She mentioned the Federal Bristol Bay RAC was wishing some of the AC chairs could participate in RAC meetings to explain positions and coordinate where possible. Cody Larson BBNA Nat Res. noted that April 1 is the deadline for fish proposals and offered to help people with subsistence proposals.

AC Chair Brito reviewed BOG schedule: BOG to meet in person in Wasilla; January 20 is a work session, and it is good that BBNA can help some folks attend. Additionally, the Nushagak AC is tentatively scheduled to meet February 3 to prepare for BOF.

Alaska Wildlife Troopers:

Trooper Wittkop did a quick summary of annual activities. 1) Vessel Kvichak has been sold, therefore no patrol vessel for Togiak Herring. Patrolled by air and few violations observed. 2) conducted CDQ halibut patrols jointly with NMFS; 41 people contacted, more of an info and education effort, while it's a Federal fishery the Troopers are increasing their collaboration due in part to previous local complaints of gear conflicts with near shore yellow fin sole trawl fleet. Troopers were observing the trawl fleet as well. 3) Spring 21 Bear: Lots of snow allowed hunting access. No violations observed. Wittkop discussed issues around the sale of bear hides. Seller needs a permit and needs to post permit number when advertising a sale. 4) Sport Fish enforcement: limited effort due to intense commercial fishery and less staff. 5) Commercial fishery: Troopers had one additional pilot, 1 small boat for a big season. Violations were about normal, main problems were close waters and close period violations. Lots of rough weather and huge catches seemed to cause a higher rate of failure to report lost nets. Weather seemed to push some into violations in the Snake River area. One violator was selling fish using presigned fish tickets without permit holder present; 1 over length set net, 1 set netter not fishing in reported stat area. Wittkop also mentioned under-reporting of king salmon in the catch. 6) Fall Big Game: relaxed covid travel rules seemed to bring a surge of nonresident hunters compared to 2020. Hunter compliance was generally good; 2 under size bulls and one cow were reported. There was confusion among hunter about harvest tickets versus registration hunts and the difference in hunt stipulations. Wittkop encountered a problem with a bear DLP

reporting and salvage. 7) Winter moose: little activity yet and travel conditions poor but patrols will be conducted. 8) Subsistence: complaints continue regarding illegal subsistence drift netting for kings. Wittkop noted a new anonymous and easier reporting system and encouraged concerned people to use it. AK Tips Hotline. 9) Equipment: vessel Kvichak has been sold and not replaced yet. AWT is coordinating with NMFS on a new vessel to be built; its likely to be based in Kodiak.

VIII. Public & AC Member Comments

Questions from the AC were directed to Todd Rinaldi regarding hunter participation and harvest by residency. No data was immediately available, but Rinaldi offered to email AC members when data became available.

AC member Kenneth Nukwak from Manokotak was concerned that in addition to fish by-catch that's been in the news, "what about yellow fin sole trawlers' by-catch of clams?" He saw a photo of boats possibly near Round Island and they may be taking 20,000 to 40,000 pounds of clams where the walrus feeding grounds are. Is this why the walrus has moved to Ugashik area and no longer using areas around Walrus Is?

AC Secretary, also a member of the Federal Bristol Bay RAC, noted that the RAC is very concerned about by-catch, received some presentations during its fall meeting but NPFMC was not present. The RAC has specifically requested NPFMC present to the winter meeting in February.

AC member Joe Chythlook noted he has listened to some NPFMC meetings, his son Craig has been appointed to address by-catch from a food security level. Joe further noted there has been quite a change in walrus behavior around Walrus Is., that from his observations while flying in the area, trawling has seemed to get closer and closer to shore and he hopes the the AC could consider working with the NPFMC and or NMFS to investigate this.

- ADF&G Boards- Taryn O'Connor-Brito
 Update on changes made to the Board of Fisheries and Board of Game meeting schedules due to COVID 19.
- Commercial Fisheries- Jordan Head
 - Update on Togiak salmon season summary for 2020 and forecast for 2021.
 - 2020 Togiak run fell below 20-year average. Harvest was also a little below average. Escapement goal was met. Forecast for next year is pretty much right at 20-year average. It was a decent year for Chinook. Chum returns were low throughout western Alaska. Test fishery evidence suggests that this should rebound.
 - Comment from member that there may be interest in submission of a proposal to address the king line. Tim Sands cautions the AC that submitting a proposal could have an unintended consequence.
 - Frank comments that lack of enforcement presence is noted at Anchor Point line, and that the setnet fleet could benefit for more of an enforcement presence. Kenneth concurred with Frank's assessment.
 - Jimmy is interested in the status of funding for the Togiak tower. Tim Sands states that the current plan is to operate, notwithstanding any budget cuts. The Togiak tower seems to be one of the first things to get cut when there is a shortage. Tim is trying to keep it operating.
 - Moses notes that when the sport fishery on the Nushagak is doing poorly many sport fisherman come to the Togiak. The AC is interested in historic escapement numbers for kings from both before and after the line went into effect. Tim notes that there is no directed count on kings. Moses also notes that conservation for kings has been an issue and suggests high seas trawling may be something the AC needs to address with the NPFMC. Jimmy suggests



- BBNA may be of help in staffing the Togiak tower if funding is short. Cody Larson affirms that it may be a possibility.
- Mike Gilbert wants to know the proposal submission deadline for fisheries proposals. Tim and Taryn believe it has been extended until May 10. Cody is leaving for another meeting but wants AC members to be aware that BBNA can provide technical support in getting proposals drafted. Taryn will forward Cody's contact info to AC members.
- Sport Fish- Lee Borden

Sport Harvest of Kings: 2019 total harvest was 1,617. 725 of those were over 20 inches. 2020 effort down to 20-30% of normal due to COVID, no staff on the river. Plan to do a sport fish survey in 2021. Lee will provide chairman Kritz with last 5 years of data for chinook.

- Togiak National Wildlife Refuge (Wildlife)- Andy Adermann
 - Nush Pen Caribou on decline. 209 caribou found during last survey. This was fewer than expected. Planning committee opened hunt for 5 caribou. All permits offered to community of Manokotak. Manokotak declined to use them. Recently caribou have been congregating around Picnic Beach and Kulukuk. Weather has not been cooperating for flying.
 - -Kenneth wants to know what is contributing to the decline, and if it is predator related, or if the caribou left the area. Frank is also interested in the wolf population. Andy says there is no place on the refuge that wolves do not use. Pat Walsh is supervising the wolf study.
 - Pat Walsh says the refuge has about 10 years' worth of data on wolves. There are approximately 11 packs, averaging 7 per pack, but size varies significantly. Population is probably about 75 or so. Wolves do feed on caribou, but they are not the main population driver. Population on caribou decreased due to management for habitat concerns. It went farther than wanted. Part of why the caribou are congregating in Kulukuk may be to get away from pursuit by snowmachine.
 - Moses would like an update on 17A moose.
 - Andy says in October 2019 survey counted 2,130. 10% decline from 2017. Long term goal is to get it down to 800-1200.
- Wildlife Conservation- Brian Riley, and Todd Rinaldi

Introduction: Brian is the new wildlife biologist for GMU 17. Currently in Illinois. Should be in Dillingham by the end of February.

Mulchatna caribou: Fall comp estimated around 13,500. Same as last year. Range has been fairly predictable recently. There are 60 GPS collars out, making locating groups easier.

Moose: Success rate has been high, and season in progress will likely remain open until Feb 7.

Alaska Wildlife Troopers- Joseph Wittkop

Federal Fisheries: No violations

Herring Fishery: Only a few minor violations noted. Only issued warnings.

Spring Bear: Low participation; no violations.

Sport Fish: Reduced participation due to COVID. Enforcement team not funded.

West Side Comm Fish: Limited staff. Still present. Saw closed period violations, closed waters violations, lack of marking, failure to report lost gear.

Togiak Comm Fish: No boat present. Violations for close period for set net. Hours or days late. Waste cases. Permit holder not present. Also, markings.

Winter Game: Good compliance with closed season for moose. Saw evidence of a few caribou taken out of season. Hears the concern for lack of AWT presence in Togiak and will make requests for additional patrols. Have been limited by staffing but will do what he can.

- Moses is curious what part of the summer is worst for violations. His personal feeling is it gets worse later in the season. Joe says high volume days and yes, later in the season.
- Peter notes that violations in the fall are common out at the points and are regularly not followed up due to lack of presence by enforcement. Joe hears and understands.



- Jordan Head asks Joe to explain what info is most beneficial when reporting violations. Joe says it is useful to have time, date location, and type of violation. Specifics like GPS coordinates, CFEC or ADF&G numbers, names, photos or videos containing identifying landmarks also helpful.
- Moses asks Joe to explain circumstances where waste may be considered. Storms? Late on time? Joe states that the short answer is Fishermen are responsible for anything caught, and anything caught needs to be salvaged. Bad quality is not a violation, but cases of abandoned gear where nothing is salvageable for any use. That is waste.

- I. Discuss BOF and BOG Schedule Changes
 - Taryn explains that the Board of Game will re-visit what to do with the current proposals in the proposal book, and whether or not to re-open the call.
 - Moses asks Todd to give a short overview of proposals currently in the book relating to GMU
 17A. moose. Todd provided the following list.
 - o Prop 12- Antlerless Moose Reauthorization- needs dealt with at this meeting.
 - Prop 13- Department proposal seeking to change the draw hunt for moose. Trying to increase harvest. Developed by Todd, and Lauren, recognizing that this was developed without input from the AC.
 - Prop 14- Department Proposal Increase RM575 and RM576 season dates. 31-day window is currently floating. This would set a 2-month fixed season for January-February. Again, trying to increase harvest, and opportunity.
 - o Props 15-17- Bow hunting proposals. Bowhunting only opportunity.
 - o Proposal 6- Brown Bear Tag fee exemption. Not a moose proposal but does need dealt with at this meeting.
 - Moses believes that the moose population needs to be controlled. He thinks there may be support for bringing more nonresident hunters in when the moose population is above management objectives, but that the population fell below the 1,200 mark that the support for the extra non-resident effort would not be there. Proposals 12, 13, and 14 will probably find support.
 - If the call for proposals were to re-open the AC may consider submitting an additional moose proposal to open moose seasons in 17A earlier.
 - Note: Thomas Dock has joined the meeting.
 - Kenneth and Moses note that when 17A is discussed the reliance of the community of Manokotak as well as Togiak needs to be kept in mind. Manokotak is outside the boundary, but the boundary is close, and the area is heavily used by the community for subsistence.
 - Taryn explains the change of schedules for the BOF and BOG will result in overlap of cycle for those boards in the Southwest Region.
 - This is new information for the Togiak AC. Walter suggests that it may be worth having another meeting in a couple of weeks to give the AC time to regroup. Moses concurs.

Tim Sands (Comm Fish AMB)

Season summary and forecast available at website

King Salmon not doing well statewide, ADF&G don't really understand why. People encourage to use smaller net gear. Trawlers out by Round Island bycatch mostly halibut, no salmon species, no information about trawlers elsewhere. Jimmy C. said the Togiak commercial fisherman had been following King Salmon conservation regulation for subsistence since declining King returns. He mentioned the sports fishing industry in the Togiak river have no conservation regulations in place. Tim S. responded that the AC group submit proposals, Jimmy C asked for Cody Larson (BBNA) to help AC in forming a proposal for sports fishing industry.

Ed Wilber asked Tim S about the transfer date of other east bay fisherman to Togiak bay. TS responded the transfer date (July 27) is because someone wanted it to go entirely. Taryn will let Ed W know; AC will set a date to go back to his question about the commercial fisheries question.

Moses K asked Tim S on how long Togiak fishermen have been on King conservation?

Tim S said Kings are not so productive as they used to be. Moses K would like see more research, Tim S countered don't have budget, suggested AC talk to Senators and Representatives. Ed W asked Tim S if there was a long-term solution in the future? Tim S said observers general feeling is its cyclical with ocean conditions. Spawning habitat is in good shape, don't have solution for ocean. Ed W asked about guidance on what sort of proposals? Hatcheries? Tim S would not suggest hatcheries. Moses K asked about the chum salmon being in decline for the past 3 years? Tim S agreed, Nushagak and all of western Alaska has same decline, points to something in the ocean has changed,

hoping its cyclical, no one knows for sure. Early life history for young salmon in the ocean, predation?, some specie goes up and another goes down. Moses K had a question on area M about same species, Tim S said even less down there, he said he will look into for next meeting.

Chris Brockman-Wildlife

He said area 17B is closed, 17A moose hunt is open until January 20, 2022. Wants AC to look at proposal to reauthorize management for 17A. Jimmy C asked Chris about moose count, he answered last count in Refuge was 2017. Andy Aderman had numbers: 2017 survey @ 2400 moose, 2019 survey @ 2100 moose. Andy A hopes to have another count March 2022. Moses K asked Andy about count being low and if it was predation. Andy said moose management plan goal is 800 to 1200 moose, and when it doubled started to try bring down by harvest, some predation by bear and wolves. Calf survival down in 17A and Goodnews area throughout summer even though calves are many. So combination of harvest and lack of survival for down count. Moses asked about proxy hunting, Chris B believes antlerless moose and one antlered is ok to proxy.

Joe Wittkop-AWT

Togiak herring season violations-few crew with no license.

Joint enforcement with Federal on yellowfin sole trawling.

Spring bear hunts with guides, no violations observed.

Sport fishing has limited funding to observe, have spot checks, observed not many violations.

Commercial Fishing, they had vessel patrol in bay and aerial surveillance of closed bays and during closed periods. Observed on crew member was fishing permit while permit holder was in Anchorage and suggested processors need to verify. Some setnets were beyond max distance, they need to respect regulations.

Fall hunting 2021, one sublegal moose and one cow taken, mentioned salvage bear kills still a struggle.

Winter moose hunt is still on going, conditions ok in spite of the rain.

Joe W said the SOA launched a new Anonymous reporting for Fish and Game violations called AKtips. (computer/app based for cellphones, not a call In procedure)

Jimmy C asked about Yellowfin sole bycatch, Joe W said they inspect catches and licensing, open holds & check labeling, didn't see King salmon bycatch, saw halibut and cod, doesn't have numbers on bycatch because they get turned over to the federal side. Moses K asked about the AKtip. Thomas D asked about where to find trawler regulations. NOAA and National Marine Fisheries were mentioned for trawlers.

Roger W brought up King salmon management and that the numbers of them caught need to be monitored, should ask for historical numbers of kings since when the conservation line in Togiak bay was put in place, suggested sonar counts and also get

bycatch numbers from trawlers.

Cody L from BBNA offered his phone number and will help with proposals.

Roger W said conservation efforts have been made by local fishermen by following regulations and gear size, there needs to be counts on returning Kings and not just catch and management needs to be in area and more regulations on sports fishing.

Tim S came back from call, they have been talking to sport fish side, wants AC to reach out to sports fishing industry and ask for surveys and other things, call legislative representatives and share some funding base.

Ed W asked about sport fishing catch logs, and Tim S responded that it was axed as soon as Dunleavy got into office.

Moses K said of the discussion on King salmon for area are all valid and would like to see more data from the sport fishing industry. Tim S will pass on to "Lee" for next meeting.

Joe Alexie comment that a local from Togiak observed gutted salmon floating on river and was mentioned in a previous AC meeting and has not seen anything come of incident.

Thomas D mentioned that caribou was closed and asked about the numbers. Chris B said current estimates on Mulchatna is 13000 and they want to see 30000. He said the eastern herd seems stable, but the western section is declining and are looking at calves survival rate and likely no hunting next year either.

Andy A reported about the Nushagak peninsula herd; last July count was 258 caribou up from last year. estimate is 287 currently, calf count many and seems to be rebounding. Planning committee is meeting in July 2022. Aug 1 to March 15 has 8 permits available 4 for Manokotak, 2 for Aleknagik, 2 for Dillingham so far no harvest.

Ken N asked about survival rate, Andy A said 50 calves per 100 cows October observation so really good for that time of year.
