

Project WILD

A K-12 conservation education program focusing on wildlife, fostering responsible action toward natural resources.

Project WILD Activity Guides and Workshops

Each participant receives a **Project WILD** and **Project WILD Aquatic** Guide, including over 150 activities. Activities are in lesson-plan format, including objectives, methods of teaching, background information, available references, material lists, and evaluation. Workshops, workshop materials and additional handouts are provided by Alaska Department of Fish and Game. Also offered is the **Alaska Project WILD Early Childhood Curriculum** geared for early childhood educators.

Interdisciplinary and Teacher Friendly

Project WILD activities are interdisciplinary, enriching subjects, concepts and skills already taught in classrooms, at summer camps, in scouting, and at home. Each activity includes step-by-step directions, discussion topics and ideas for further study. Graduate credit for workshop participation is available through the University of Alaska.

Great for Schools & Communities

Six- to 15-hour workshops are conducted during in-service days, in the evening, or on weekends. Graduate courses are also available. Community members are strongly encouraged to participate and present local knowledge relating to wildlife. School districts provide food and lodging for a trained workshop facilitator. Participants pay \$20 [\$30.00 for combined WILD/PLT workshops] to support workshop costs. All other expenses for the workshop are provided by the Alaska Department of Fish and Game.

Correlated to State Standards

Project WILD activities are correlated to Alaska's State Content Standards using a rating system. The guide, *Alaska Correlations*, is available on line.

Alaska Wildlife Curriculum

The Alaska Wildlife Curriculum introduces teachers to state specific ecological issues and concepts with the newly revised **Wetlands & Wildlife** Curriculum along with **Alaska's Forests**, **Alaska's Tundra**, **Alaska's Ecology**, **Wildlife for the Future** and **Alaska Ecology Cards**. Activities are in lesson-plan format, including objectives, methods of teaching, background information, available references, material lists, and evaluation. This curriculum is provided through Project WILD workshops.

Custom, Advanced and Themed Workshops

Project WILD workshops can be designed for specific regional interests. We have additional themed programs such as Understanding and Taking Action on Climate Change, Alaska's boreal Forest, and exploring Alaska's Wetlands.
