Nonpelagic rockfish

While any nonpelagic rockfish species would qualify for a catch-and-release trophy, the more commonly caught nonpelagic rockfish that would generally meet the minimum length requirements for a catch-and-release trophy include, yelloweye, silvergray, shortraker, and rougheye. Pelagic rockfish

While any pelagic rockfish species would qualify for a catch-and-release trophy, the more commonly caught pelagic rockfish that would generally meet the minimum length requirements for a catch-and-release trophy include, black, yellowtail, and widow. Measuring your fish



Measurements of fish are from the tip of the nose of the fish to the tip of the tail. If possible, please provide a photo of the fish on a measuring tape to verify accuracy.
