\* Keep king and coho salmon as well as steelhead trout in the water when measuring/photographing.

If possible, please provide a photo of the fish on a measuring tape to verify accuracy of measurement.

Chum salmon	30 inches
Coho salmon	30 inches
King salmon	45 inches

Pink salmon	25 inches
Coastal cutthroat trout (sea-run)	16 inches
Lake trout	30 inches
Lingcod	45 inches
Northern pike	35 inches
Rainbow/steelhead trout	25 inches
Nonpelagic Rockfish (see qualifying species on next page)	25 inches
Pelagic Rockfish (see qualifying species on next page)	20 inches

#### Nonpelagic rockfish

While any nonpelagic rockfish species would qualify for a catch-and-release trophy, the more commonly caught nonpelagic rockfish that would generally meet the minimum length requirements for a catch-and-release trophy include, yelloweye, silvergray, shortraker, and rougheye. ### Pelagic rockfish

While any pelagic rockfish species would qualify for a catch-and-release trophy, the more commonly caught pelagic rockfish that would generally meet the minimum length requirements for a catch-and-release trophy include, black, yellowtail, and widow.
