General workshop info:

Workshop size: Most require a minimum of 10 people with a maximum of 30.

Workshop length: Length varies from two to 15 hours depending on the nature of the material and the needs of the group.

Professional development: Graduate level credit is available for some workshops.

Workshop locations and cost: Facilitators are willing to travel throughout the state. Any assistance you can offer with food, lodging and travel helps in our efforts to serve you. A nominal materials fee is charged for each participant.

All workshop materials are:

Interdisciplinary: Activities cross subject lines and enrich concepts and skills already taught in classrooms.

Project WILD/ Alaska Wildlife Curriculum Workshop

Beyond Wild Workshops

This workshop will help you introduce pre-kindergarten children to the natural world through a wide range of activities and experiences. Growing Up WILD provides an early foundation for developing positive impressions about the natural world and lifelong social and academic skills. Growing Up WILD is correlated to the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) Standards and the Head Start Domains. Participants will receive a copy of the Growing Up Wild activity guide.

Kids in Nature Workshop

Kids in Nature Workshops are designed for families and small groups and focus on getting children and their adults outside. Led by ADF&G staff or their partners, the workshops guide participants through activities and discoveries that help engage children in discovering the great outdoors and encourage free play, which is so important to a child's development.
