Trail Description

Mastodon Trail winds through spruce forest for onehalf mile before entering a former forest fire burn area, then descends to the Nugget Creek Public-use Cabin at mile 12. The cabin is also accessed using the South Fork Winter Trail when the river is frozen solid. Be cautious. The Chena and South Fork rivers often have thin ice and open water, even in late winter.

Travel Means: Hike, bike, ski, horseback, snowshoe Elevation Gain: 700 feet





Previously only accessible to hikers by fording rivers or creeks, the 12-mile journey along Mastodon Trail allows overland access to one of eleven Chena River State Recreation Area public-use cabins. The Nugget Creek Cabin is now available yearround via non-motorized transportation.
