Dear Lieutenant Governor Dahlstrom:

The Department of Law has reviewed the attached regulations of the Board of Fisheries against the statutory standards of the Administrative Procedure Act. Based upon our review, we find no legal problems. This letter constitutes the written statement of approval under AS 44.62.060(b) and (c) that authorizes your office to file the attached regulations. The regulations were adopted by the Board of Fisheries after the close of the public comment period.

The regulations concern the Southeast area sport, subsistence, commercial, and personal use fisheries.

The November 3, 2024 public notice and the April 2, 2025 certification of adoption order both state that this action is not expected to require an increased appropriation. Therefore, a fiscal note under AS 44.62.060 is not required.

Because our technical corrections change the page count of the regulations, we respectfully request that your office handwrite the correct number of pages (59) on the certification of adoption order.

Additionally, we respectfully request that these regulations take effect as soon as possible. The Department of Fish and Game publishes annual regulation summaries to assist participants in all fisheries. It does not generate the publications until it can incorporate new regulations resulting from adoption by the Board of Fisheries. An earlier effective date would make the publications available to the public sooner and provide a valuable tool that aids in compliance and enforcement of the newly adopted regulations.

We have made some technical corrections necessary to conform the regulations in accordance with AS 44.62.060. The corrections are incorporated into the attached copy of the regulations.
