Our oceans and streams are interrelated and the above losses have cumulative repercussions. Copper River chinook are in peril. Up-river users, from Gakona to Slana, have not gotten their fish 13 of the last 15 years (RC 062). Gulkana hatchery no longer achieves broodstock for the salmon enhancement program. No tributaries in the watershed are accounted for, nor are the spawning grounds.

These are times of uncertainty. Until a positive shift is seen, it is imperative to "err on the side of conservation" as previously stated by a board member. Supporting Proposal 7 would be a step in protecting this entire watershed from the unknown complexities of the future.
