1. Call to Order: meeting called to order by Chair Charlie Lean at 1337hrs
2. Roll Call (8 members required to meet quorum)

4. Approval of Agenda: Motion Made by Kevin Knowlton, Second by Jacob Mannix to approve the agenda as amended. Ad BOG Proposition 120 to the agenda. Motion carried unanimous
5. Chairman's Report/Update:
 - a. The caribou working group met telephonically, they recommended that the department maintain a conservative approach to the herd management though the herd population seems to have stabilized.
 - b. The chair had published a note to the Federal Seward Peninsula Regional Advisory Council reference the Norton Sound Red King Crab population not having recovered enough yet to support a commercial season while maintaining the subsistence harvest. The SPRAC put their opposition to a commercial fishery on record.
 - c. The Chair mentioned the the National Park Service had made new rules regarding navigable waters to respond to the fact they had lost to Sturgeon in the Supreme Court.
6. ADF&G Wildlife Division Report / Update: Bill Dunker and Sara Germain
 - a. In response to a question from Jack Fagerstrom about wolf population on the Seward Peninsula, Bill Dunker stated that a wolf population survey in Unit 22 had not been done and that it would be very difficult. The technique used to determine the amount of wolf predation on big game in the unit is by referencing when collared animals tend to be killed and it is mostly in the springtime after bears have come out of hibernation.
 - b. The RM840, Unit 22 registration Moose hunt was very brief this year, the harvest was maintained at a sustainable level. The department does not have enough data yet to



see if limiting the permit availability made a difference especially with having to factor in local COVID-19 travel restrictions. 520 RM840 Permits were issued with 300ish hunters actually hunting. Survey of Unit 22D and 22E shows that the moose populations remain stable with 33 bulls to every 100 cows. Which indicates that the department should maintain status quo.

Jack Fagerstrom asked if due to COVID -19 the department would be providing the opportunity for the harvest of extra moose or releasing access to caribou tracking information. Bill Dunker advised that the issue of extra moose is being addressed at the state level with no decision yet and public access to the caribou collar locations is restricted by state law but what he could share was that the majority of the heard has not migrated south of the Kobuk nor west onto the Seward Peninsula yet this year.

Tom Gray asked if the department had considered shortening the reporting times for moose harvest so the department could close the season in the fall leaving a portion of the harvest available for a winter hunt. Bill Dunker stated that the department feels that it is not at a point where they need to make any changes at this time. Jack Fagerstrom expressed that the winter hunting opportunity is vary important to the residence of Golovin because of limited access during the fall hunt.

Brandon Ahmasuk asked, when was the last ANS study done in Unit 22 for moose? And if 321 bull moose harvest in unit 22 was sustainable? Bill Dunker advised it has been a number of years since an ANS study had been done and that any changes to the ANS required board action but a proposal to the board addressing the issue would be the way to address it and the deadline for proposals to the board will be due in the spring of 2022.

- c. Seward Peninsula Muskox – the population survey is scheduled for February 2021, last years harvest data showed 28 muskox bulls were harvested in Game Management Unit 22 which was approximately 2.1% of the population. The Seward Peninsula Muskox population appears to have stabilized. Unit 22A will have a scheduled hunt in RY21, though a hunt of the population in unit 22B East, near Koyuk has been underutilized. Consideration of separating management of 22B West and East is being considered.

7. New Business – Board of Game

The State of Alaska Joint Board of Fish and Game asked for input from the Advisory Committees on how they would like to see the board handle future meetings with the uncertainty of COVID-19 restrictions? The NNSAC prefers in person meetings but with circumstances being what they are Telephonic meetings will work. Due to connectivity issues in the smaller villages Zoom, Teams and others virtual means are not practical. Meetings should not be postponed with some time sensitive issues needing action. For example, the Norton sound Red King crab commercial season and the delicacy of the current population. As things in the population change, they need to be addressed in a timely manner.

Board of Fish

- a. Jim Menard Region manager for Fish reported that the 2019 Salmon harvest and return was not good, and the department is not sure why. The trawl surveys of 2015



did show that this might be the case but nothing definitive. By using the Trawl survey of 2016 data 2021 should be better.

- b. Red King Crab - the Board of Fish changed the winter commercial opening date to February 1st so the season will open then. This year for a commercial harvest looks to be like last year with no buyers and only two fishermen catcher/seller not looking to have a good harvest.

Tom Gray inquired about the 2021 summer commercial season; he is very concerned about the subsistence availability.

Wes Jones inquired as to what is the biomass of 5" males. Jim Menard replied that information is not available now and that is an allocative issue. He suggested if the AC disagreed with the Harvest Guideline we take it up at the Crab Planning Team. Charlie Lean asked of Jim Menard, Have you read the regulation on how to manage the crab fishery in the King and Tanner Crab Management Policy? Jim replied that the guidance from the BOF had sunseted and that the crab planning team will be meeting next week.

Tom Gray stated that subsistence crab harvest has really taken a hit and the priority is subsistence and because the manager still focuses a commercial fishery while planning on having an opening for the commercial season.

8. Public Comment

Jack Fagerstrom for the village of Golovin, With COVID -19 we need to be able to get food with the least amount of gas usage. What resources are available to us? We need to be provided with information on the location of harvestable game.

3. Agenda and meeting leadership

No agenda had been developed other than the directive from the full Advisory Committee to develop comments and responses to Board of Game Proposal 271 in time for the public comment period deadline February 18, 2022.

Members present asked Gayla to lead the meeting and Dan to record minutes.

Members agreed the guiding principles for the meeting and final recommendations would must include: In GMU 17, to preserve maximum opportunity to hunt wolves from snowmachine with minimal restrictions.

Gayla summarized the history of how Nushagak AC came to submit proposal 23.

Dan noted there is a parallel proposal WP22-40 in the Federal subsistence regulatory process and due to be addressed April 2020 by the Federal subsistence board. Dan noted that at the fall Bristol Bay RAC (BBRAC) meeting WP22-40 had been supported with the 15

mph and 300 yard language assuming the State language on positioning was “settled”. With the actions at the January BOG meeting the consequences were more far reaching. At the February 8 RAC meeting the members of the BBRAC were informed of the BOG actions then voted to request the Federal Subsistence Board (FSB) remove WP22-40 from their consent agenda, and to explain how strong objections to that positioning language has arisen. Further the BBRAC charged their chair to request the FSB to not act on WP 22-40; that there may be an effort to delay action on 271 for a year and; to wait until the State language and action on 271 is resolved.

Dan also presented comments emailed to him by WT Lt Rodgers on how enforcement has dealt with the existing positioning regulations in GMU 18, 22, 23, and 26A.

Dan presented some suggestions he obtained from retired biologist including: don’t tie hunting with snowmachines to Intensive Management as IM can expire, change quickly and is often only allowed in limited areas.

There was a long discussion on the history of regulations, how hunting wolves with snowmachines is conducted, historical practices of group hunting, potential regulatory language, whether to exclude wolverines, concerns for other laws that might make it difficult to write an effective regulation.

- Much emphasis was made that 15 miles per hour is an unacceptable restriction.
- Wolves can run much faster. Wolverines travel at a lope all the time.
- The 300 yard restriction is unacceptable; wolves are small targets and by the time a snowmachine is stopped a running wolf or wolverine will be at 400+ yards. A hunter isn’t likely to make an ethical shot on a wolf or the even smaller wolverine at 300 yards or more. We need to get much closer as we often use smaller caliber rifles that quickly lose effectiveness on these animals beyond 50 yards.
- Members believe the current annual harvest of wolves helps the caribou and moose herds.
- Strategy was discussed. Ask to delay for a board cycle due to short notice and need to inform other ACs not in this cycle? Provide only comments and let BOG develop language or provide some language in an effort to assure board can more easily accommodate our needs? Concentrate only on the needs of GMU 17 (GMU 9 was often included as well since it’s in the same cycle.)

Considerable time was spent attempting to reword 271 to fit the needs of GMU 17.

After three hours the Subcommittee decided to recess until 8:30 AM Wednesday to reflect on work done, seek more data and advice, work on potential wording. On Wednesday the



Subcommittee expects to finalize comments and wording in time to submit by the February 18 deadline.

4. Discussion continued

Gayla resumed meeting with a brief summary of Feb 14 meeting.

Chris Brockman reviewed actions of BOG in January: BOG approved proposal 23 as submitted but then sought to define “positioning”. In the development of proposal 271 the 15mp and 300 yard language was used and resulted in switching the nature of the proposal 180 degrees from positioning the animal to positioning the hunter.

It was noted that positioning the hunter (per 271) is the opposite of the intent of the Nushagak AC in proposal 23.

Before going further Brockman noted his job is representing the ADFG and does not want to step outside his authority but he offered suggestions for the Subcommittee to consider as best he understands the desires of the AC.

Brockman noted it appears the AC wants hunters to be allowed to approach animals (wolf & wolverine) as fast as they want, as close as they want and as often as they want.

Brockman strongly advised that prohibiting actual contact of the quarry with a snow machine would be best.

Chris said by his understanding the following language seems to express the desires of the AC and members of the subcommittee:

.... Position: means a snowmachine may be used to approach individual game animal at any speed to within (0,5,10, x) yards and; including multiple approaches and allow the pursuit of fleeing game. A snowmachine may not be used to contact an animal.”

Brockman encouraged the Subcommittee to include the language of no contact with the game.

He then suggested the Subcommittee’s final response to clearly state our opposition to the language in 271 as well as our desire for pursuing, multiple approaches and no distance restriction.

There were several comments on:

What about moose and brown bear, other species? A: No regulation addresses positioning for moose and brown bear, other species, only wolf and wolverines.

Again the concern was expressed that this will be a Statewide regulation and could affect many other ACs and GMU that are not in this cycle and this is very short notice.

The group was reminded regulations specialists will be on hand and they may suggest to the BOG that there may be a need to differentiate between positioning hunters for some species and regulations vs positioning the animal in others.

It will be important for the AC rep at the March meeting and for others testifying to help explain some of this to the BOG.

Gayla suggested eliminating any distance restriction. The rest of the Subcommittee members and participating listeners agreed.

Trooper Wittkop said setting a particular distance might not make enforcement any easier. It can be hard to tell 5 to 10 y in these situations. It's probably simpler to make no distance rule.

Who to review and approve minutes of this meeting: Gayla by consensus.

The Subcommittee came to a consensus for the following points to make to the Board of Game.

Final Consensus

- 1) Nushagak AC is opposed to the language proposed in 271 restricting speed and distance.

- 2) Nushagak AC requests the BOG to adopt the following language:

Position: means a snowmachine may be used to approach individual game animal at any speed and; including multiple approaches and allow the pursuit of fleeing game. A snowmachine may not be used to contact an animal."

- 3) Nushagak AC requests hunters to be allowed to pursue a fleeing animal.
- 4) Nushagak AC requests no speed, distance, or number of approaches restrictions for hunting wolves and wolverines.
- 5) Nushagak AC is opposed to allowing contacting the animal with a snowmachine.
- 6) Nushagak AC notes this proposal is statewide and expresses concern for adequate notice to other AC's and residents of areas not in this Board Cycle.

5) Other Business

Gayla and Taryn reminded attendees that the BOG is offering the option for virtual testimony but there is a sign in deadline and opportunity may not be unlimited. Deadline for written comments is Feb 18, Virtual testimony deadline is February 28.

Doug Carney - Info on 2020 board meetings & proposal books

- Due to Covid there were no BOG meetings last year and no proposal books printed – all done online. I sent an email to members with documents – agenda, comp.surveys, hunter success, proposal index & supplementary prop. Index - also ACR proposals. Also sent a link to find them on the BOG website. The Agenda has a list of proposals I considered the most important for us to consider.
- Kyle sent out an email with documents attached as well.
- The whole meeting cycle was pushed back one year.
- BOG cycle was also changed from 2 yrs to 3 yrs a couple years ago, so the next Interior Regional meeting will be in 2024.
- Then earlier this year people were able to put in more proposals, so there is a supplemental list of those – also online.
- Agenda Change requests were approved producing a few more proposals.

Reading & Approval of Minutes – Minutes from the Dec.17, 2019 SHAC meeting were read by chair & approved by the committee.

Barb Carlson – Fisheries Update

- Proposal 279 passed at the Prince William Sound Finfish meeting on Nov. 30-Dec. 6.
- The King subsistence permit for use during times of closure after June 11 will again be in place for the coming fishing season. Each household can get up to 10 Kings.
- There was no BOF meeting in 2021 – Covid pushed it back to 2023.
- Anyone can submit a proposal regarding fisheries in our area. The proposal deadline is April 11th, 2022. I or Kyle can help you write a proposal, if you want help.

2021 Fishery Summary –



- King escapement was met, but not the ANS - not very good /most of the season was closed.
- Chum was not even close to escapement goal – very poor.
- Sockeye – good numbers, especially the late run, though they were smaller fish. The Kogrugluk weir escapement was not very good.
- Coho – Not very strong. George River weir #s were strong / Kogrugluk weir #s were not strong.
- Fish wisely / don't waste

Josh Peirce, Area Biologist –

Doug sent SHAC members some documents on composition surveys and moose harvest in 19A.

March, 2020 GSPE Moose survey – Moose numbers have increased in 19A.

- In 19A West, from Kalskag to the George R. / In 2010 there were 1000 – now there are 3800, mostly due to them moving in from GMU 18.
- The middle area, from Napaimute to the George there are very low numbers, as expected, due to poorer habitat.
- In RM682 & TM684, (LVMA), #s have approximately doubled since 2005, going from 1500 to 2900 moose.
- In 19A East, from the George R. and upriver, (not including the Lime Village Tier II area), numbers have increased, (RM682), from 1900 to 2500 moose.

Nov. 2021 moose composition – A count was done in November. About 5.5 hours were spent by 2 planes.

- Jon flew from about 10 miles above Stony River village down to the Holitna mouth. Then he flew from the mouth of the Hoholitna to a point about 15 miles up that river.
- Josh flew transects 1/2 mile apart on the Holitna & Titnuk Creek from the Macar Hills to Barge Slough. From Barge Slough he flew along the river to the mouth. Of the Holitna.
- “337 total moose were counted, with **63 bulls: 100 cows** – excellent, partly due to light harvest. There were **24 calves: 100 cows** which is not so good. Would like to see 30-40 calves per 100 cows. I believe it is due mainly to bear predation. Bear control was done in 2013-14, and bears have probably reached pre-control numbers again.”

Rick – Are there any plans to do more about bear numbers?

Josh – It is authorized in the predator control program, but funds aren't available at this time. The bear control done in 2013 & 14 happened due to an unexpected availability of funds at the time.

Doug – Freddy expressed concern about bears a couple years ago, since Black Bear were hanging around the village, and there are high numbers of browns in the area as well. SHAC put in a proposal to do bear control in the Lime Village Tier II area, but BOG said it couldn't justify it, saying it would be ineffective due to the sparse habitat, and cost was the other big factor.

We need to see more black bears killed. With a bag limit of 5 per year, if non-resident tag fees could be lowered or set so that one fee would allow a limit of bears to be taken by a hunter. That could appeal to non-res hunters and be effective. BOG has no authority to set or change tag fees, so it would have to be authorized by the legislature. I would like to try getting that done.

Mary Lee told of a Brown Bear in their smokehouse that her son shot. He dressed it out, & regulation required him to give it to ADF&G. She didn't think that was fair, and I agree – we probably all do. What we can do is put in a proposal for the 2024 Regional meeting, to open Brown Bear season year-round for residents, to fix that and offer more hunting opportunity.

Villages could offer a bounty on bears as well as wolves. I know McGrath pays bounties on wolves.

Josh – That's right – McGrath also offers a \$200 bounty on bears.

Doug – Great! Frank - maybe you could bring it up at a village council meeting

Doug Carney - SHAC comments on BOG Statewide Meeting Proposals

A Short History of 19A Moose Hunt Closure & Opening

& SHAC Formation

Moose numbers had been dropping for several years, due to a ban on aerial predator control starting in 1992.

2002-2004- Central Kuskokwim Moose Management Plan, (CKMMP) – Arrived at 2 choices for a vote. Voted for a Tier I Registration hunt/ wolf predator control for 19A & B

- There was a CKAC meeting right after this vote, at CKMMP last meeting – All members voted, except Doug Carney abstained, urging a complete closure along with the predator control.

2004 & 2005 -The proposed registration hunt was implemented in fall of 2004

- Aerial predator control program killed 40 wolves in 2004 & 36 in 2005
- About 1000 permits were issued each year- better harvest reporting – moose #s dropping
- 122 bulls were taken fall of 04 - and 171 fall of 05.

Nov, 2005 - CKAC meeting, the chairman wanted to continue a registration hunt in 19A, in spite of the fact that the March, 2005 moose surveys had shown that moose numbers were continuing to decline. The committee voted against a closure proposal written by Sleetmute reps for all of 19A, but then voted to support an alternate proposal to close the upper portion of 19A and continue with the registration hunt in lower 19A, which passed 8-2. The dissenting votes were the Aniak reps. This proposal was sent to boards support.

- **At this same time DF&G was doing a moose survey in 19A, so the latest data was unavailable.**
- **Several days later, with the new survey info available, the Dept. of Fish & Game made a proposal to close upper 19A and have a Tier II hunt in the lower portion.**
- Proposals on other issues were agreed on by the committee, and sent to BOG for the upcoming meeting.

Feb, 2006 - The CKAC chairman called for a teleconference, where the committee voted to withdraw its support of the proposal it had agreed to in November and a proposal was passed to have a Tier II hunt in the upper portion and a registration hunt in the lower part. This was not what the upper Kuskokwim villages needed or wanted.

2006 - 19A Moose season Closure in eastern 19A

March, 2006 - BOG Meeting

CKAC members, representing Sleetmute and Stony River, supported by their village councils and the Lime Village and Red Devil councils attended, advocating for a closure in at least part of 19A rather than a Tier II hunt – with its continuing hunting pressure. Randy Rogers of DF&G / Wildlife Division, (who had been at both the CKAC Nov,2005 meeting and was online for the Feb,2006 CKAC teleconference), helped explain and make clear to the board why these villages wanted a closure rather than Tier II. Randy had been the main organizer and mediator of the CKMMP, and explained that ADF&G had been mistaken in regard to moose herd numbers, due mainly to lack of surveys.



BOG adopted the ADF&G proposal that called for the closure upriver and Tier II downriver. This regulation has been in effect ever since. This proposal was of course supported by the Sleetmute and Stony River members of the CKAC.

Nov, 2006 - CKAC meeting was held in Aniak, and boycotted by the Aniak representative who was also the CKAC chairman. The committee had to appoint a resident of Aniak to get a quorum. With Doug Carney acting as chair, the committee elected new officers and unanimously approved proposals 16 & 17. Proposal 17 was to split the CKAC into 2 separate committees.

2007 - Stony Holitna Fish & Game Advisory Committee formed

October, 2007 Joint Boards Meeting - Proposal 17 passed, and the CKAC was split into two new committees. A smaller CKAC representing 5 villages & having 10 members was formed. SHAC was formed, representing 4 villages and having 8 members.

December 3, 2007 - The last meeting of the old CKAC was held in Kalskag, where the committee made comments on proposals for the Statewide BOG meeting in Jan, 2008, and agreed to send 4 proposals to the Region III BOG meeting in March, 2008.

Bear Aerial Predator Control in eastern 19A – Includes TKC Land

Spring 2013 & 2014 – ADF&G Bear Predator Control Program killed about 150 bears.

Feb, 2017 – Moose GSPE Count shows a harvestable Surplus in parts of 19A. This allows for a hunt other than Tier II in western 19A, but does not require eastern 19A closure area to open any sort of hunt.

- Area biologist wants SHAC to put in Agenda Change Request, (ACR), in Sept. For various reasons SHAC chair did not want to have a meeting at that time – folks are busy then & that was before the Moose survey in November. Also, fall meeting are almost always held after the November moose composition survey is done, so the committee has the latest info on the herd status.

Sept. - Hill was enlisted to put in an ACR to BOG before the Sept. 4 cut-off.

Sept. 19 & 20 – SHAC holds an early meeting, (normally meets in late November or early December - after the yearly moose composition count is done.)

- **SHAC voted to OPPOSE ACR1, urging BOG NOT to accept the ACR - or if accepted - to table it for an opening no earlier than fall, 2019.**
- *It is clear that although people in our area would like to see a hunt, they are cautious about having an opening, when numbers are still so low in the closed area of 19A.*
- *The Chair asked for and was given approval by SHAC members to write and send comments on the ACR by the deadline of Sept. 29 to BOG for the Oct 4 teleconference, and to address a possible registration hunt opening as needed at any future BOG meeting, including making SHAC's hunt recommendations available to BOG if ACR 1 is accepted OR when it is appropriate for a hunt opening that would occur not before fall, 2019.*

Oct 4- BOG makes Hill's ACR into Proposal 165 for the March BOG meeting in March, 2018



Nov, 2017 - The Area Biologist had a moose survey done in eastern 19A, which showed a very large drop from Nov, 2016 numbers.

- Bull-cow ratio dropped from 58 bulls:100 cows to **36 bulls :100 cows**
- Calf-cow ratio dropped from 55 calves:100 cows to **34 calves:100 cows.**

March, 2018 – BOG meeting in Dillingham

- With the SHAC comments from the Sept, 2017 meeting, and the oral comments & concerns voiced about the dismal results of the Nov, 2017 moose survey, BOG listened to SHAC.
- SHAC told BOG that the committee and the communities certainly wanted to hunt, as they always had, but are concerned about an opening that wipes out the little that had been gained by the closure.
- SHAC said that it would not support a hunt opening till Fall, 2019, at the earliest, with one reason given that the cows born since the bear predator program would be old enough to have calves. Also pointed out, is that this was done when McGrath had the bear removal program.
- BOG asked what SHAC thought caused the low numbers. SHAC Chair said that the wolf predator control program was not taking many wolves over the last years, due to the weather and snow conditions, or it could just be that the survey was incorrect due to it being done in early November, when visibility was not good due to snow conditions.
- BOG defers proposal till March, 2019 BOG meeting

Nov, 2018 – Area biologist does a moose survey –

- Bull-cow ratio was from 52 bulls:100 cows & **40 calves :100 cows**
- The 40 calf:100 cow ratio is **OK**, but not like it was in Nov, 2016 at 55 calves:100 cows

Dec, 2018 - SHAC Teleconference – SHAC voted to support Proposal 127, (formerly Proposal 165), as amended with SHAC conditions

March, 2019 – BOG meeting in Anchorage

- The lower cow:calf ratio from 2018 compared to 2016 was specifically pointed out by SHAC chair
- Also pointed out was that the surveys had been done within the Bear Control Focus Area, where there was a much higher number of moose per square mile, (1.5 per sq. mile) than over the rest of the closure area, or 19A as a whole, (both 0.6 per sq. mile).
- BOG accepted **all** SHAC amendments for hunt conditions, and passed Proposal 127 as amended by SHAC.

Fall, 2019 – There will be a Registration Hunt in eastern 19A

NOTE:

ADF&G did an area-wide wolf survey Feb. 24-27. A total of 14 packs with 84 wolves were counted, but some of the packs were on the edge of the area – in and out of it, which the Dept. counts ½ of that number of wolves as being in the area. This puts the estimated number of wolves in 19A at 60.

There was a bear survey and tagging attempted in April, 2019, but the conditions were not good, with too much snow & ice still on the lakes. After 3 days, only one brown and one black bear were seen, so the survey was cancelled.



Thanks to the hunt conditions above, if these predators are not thinned out, and the bull – cow ratio goes down to 35 bulls: 100 cows average for 2 years, the hunt area will go back to a closure.

This is consistent with what SHAC, and the villages it represents, advocated for when the the closure began. compared to going into a Tier II hunt status.

The calf-cow ratio has already gone down to 40 calves: 100 cows. This ratio is high enough to allow the herd to increase.



GMU19A Moose Hunter Success Rates / 1977 through 2021

- **Harvest tickets for moose started being used in 1963.**
- *Because harvest tickets were not widely used by subsistence hunters in remote areas of the state, the reported harvest does not reflect the actual harvest. This is mentioned repeatedly in yearly moose hunter success narratives.*
- *Moose harvest totals typically had a note on them saying that “due to poor harvest reporting, 33% of the total could be added to get a more accurate total of moose taken.”*
- *From 1961-76, harvest tables & narratives give #s for all of GMU19. 19A and the other subunits are not reported separately.*
- *From 1969-1973, there were no harvest tables, but biologists wrote narratives on what they believed were the number of moose taken. From 1973-85, for some years, there are both table & narrative.*
- *Narratives would typically say “Total moose taken was probably in excess of 500, exceeded 400, or between 500 and 700.”*
- *There were consistently **500 - 1000 hunters** in GMU 19A in the following years. This is indicated in the narratives before 1985-6, & also reflected in the registration hunt years of 2004 and 2005, when there was the most accurate harvest reporting.*
- **1977 is the first year that numbers are available for subunit 19A**

- above the Oskwalik River at 0.

At the Spring, 2006 Region III BOG Meeting, the board reset the GMU 19 ANS & nested the #s in the subunits -

- GMU 19 has an ANS of 400-700, (excluding Lime Village Management Area - LVMA)
- **19A 175-225 ANS**, (LVMA 30-40)
- 19B 20-24
- 19D East 130-150- (not in regulation)
- 19C & 19D remainder 75-301

At that meeting, BOG also passed ADF&G Proposal 70, which

- closed moose hunting in 19A East (upriver of the George River), and
- established a Tier II hunt in 19A West, (downstream of the George River).

Although it is not in regulation, the ANS estimate for Unit 19(D-East) made during discussions of the McGrath wolf predation control program is 130 - 150 moose.

If the ANS #s from subunits 19A,B,D(east)- are added up and subtracted from the total GMU 19 ANS - it leaves 75-301 moose necessary for subsistence opportunity in Units 19(C) and Unit 19(D) Remainder.

These are largely inaccessible areas.




PROPOSAL 171 – Divide Unit 19A into Two Subunits










1977 Map
