Those I oppose include 75 (the gunning down of predators from helicopters is inhumane and not scientifically based. Bears and wolves are important to the ecosystem as well as to tourism); 2 (bear baiting is inhumane, not good sportsmanship, and is a safety issue as bears become habituated to human

handouts); 3 (the use of cellular cameras is much like same-day land and shoot hunting, which is illegal. Using cameras in this way is not hunting, it is exterminating via the aid of an electronic device); 32 (there is already a predator control program in place, thus no need for a year-round hunting season on bears); 33&34 (same-day airborne taking of bears and wolves is not necessary and not sportsmanlike. It should not be allowed, with or without a permit); (58 (the current wolf population of approx. 300 in this area should be preserved); 59&60 (there is no need to change the current regulations, which do not impact breeding seasons); 79 (again, no need to change current regs, which do not impact the breeding seasons. Having lived in Alaska my entire life, loving the outdoors, being an avid hunter and fisherman as well as a former big game guide, I do not understand the aggressive targeting of predators in a way which appears that the BOG wants to eliminate them entirely, without acknowledging that they are an important part of the ecosystem.

What research is the state conducting to determine caribou habitat capacity for the Mulchatna herd? The target level of 30,000 does not have enough data to support it as a realistic and achievable goal. It may not be feasible to manage the Mulchatna caribou at a sustained population level that permits high-levels of human harvest since the ADF&G's own historical data shows dramatic swings in the Mulchatna's herd size.

Studies have shown that bears are highly individualistic in their hunting habits. A blanket cull over a target area will likely kill bears that do not prey upon caribou at all. It would be a waste of effort and resources which would not yield the desired results.

The state should work on alternative measures to increase caribou herd size. Indigenous Protectors programs have been shown to be effective method; it was successful in southern British Columbia.

Predator control, in addition to being ineffective, is not the state's only option. Bears and wolves play a vital role in maintaining a healthy overall ecosystem. These animals are worth far more alive than as trophies.

Encouraging overhunting may bring short-term profits, but it risks long-term devastation. Overhunting key species—like brown bears, caribou, and moose—will disrupt the food web and make it harder for all animals to survive. Tourists will stop coming if there are no animals to see, and ecosystems will struggle to recover. Protecting wildlife is better for Alaska's environment and economy in the long run.

Below, I have addressed each proposal in numerical order to explain why they are unsustainable and dangerous.

OPPOSE Proposal 1: Reauthorize the brown bear tag fee exemptions

Allowing hunters to kill bears without paying a fee reduces the money needed to protect wildlife and keep populations healthy. Bears reproduce slowly—only every 4 to 6 years—so overhunting could wipe them out. Protecting bears is better for Alaska's economy because tourists come to see them alive, not dead.

OPPOSE Proposal 2: Open two bear baiting seasons

Baiting bears with food teaches them to rely on human handouts, which makes them more likely to get into dangerous conflicts with people. It's not fair or natural to trick animals like this, and killing bears that are just trying to survive harms the entire ecosystem.

OPPOSE Proposal 3: Allow the use of cellular cameras for bear hunting over bait

Using high-tech cameras to hunt bears gives hunters an unfair advantage and disrupts wildlife by bringing too many people into sensitive habitats. This kind of hunting is more about gadgets than skill and puts too much pressure on bear populations that are already struggling.

OPPOSE Proposal 4: Establish general season, archery-only sheep hunts

Sheep are an important part of mountain ecosystems. Overhunting them would force predators like bears to find food elsewhere, which can lead to more conflicts with humans. It's better to let nature manage itself than to risk upsetting the balance.

SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENT Proposal 5: Reduce the nonresident bag limit for caribou

While limiting caribou hunting seems like a good idea, it could make hunters shift their focus to other animals, like bears or moose. Caribou can have babies every year, but bears reproduce much more slowly, so we need to protect them more. Having said that, there are indications some populations are collapsing due to human activity, so all hunting should CEASE until such time as reasons for this are made clear through scientific facts and studies. Nonresidents should NOT be allowed to hunt caribou, nor anyone other than indigenous people specifically using it as a food source, not a trophy.

SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENT Proposal 6: Shorten the nonresident caribou hunting season

Shortening the hunting season might reduce pressure on caribou, but it could increase hunting of other animals, like bears, which are already at risk. Hunting should stop given collapses in most populations. Nonresidents should not be allowed to hunt caribou. Nonresidents should NOT be allowed to hunt caribou, nor anyone other than indigenous people specifically using it as a food source, not a trophy.

SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENT Proposal 7: Extend the caribou hunting season

Extending the hunting season disturbs not only caribou but also the bears and wolves that rely on them for food. This hurts the entire ecosystem and makes it harder for wildlife to recover. With studies showing collapse in all of the populations, all hunting should cease. Nonresidents should NOT be allowed to hunt caribou, nor anyone other than indigenous people specifically using it as a food source, not a trophy.

OPPOSE Proposal 8: Clarify hunting feral reindeer on Umnak Island

Even though reindeer aren't native, allowing hunting could disturb the island's natural balance. The ecosystem is better off if nature is left to manage itself.

OPPOSE Proposal 9: Lengthen spring and fall brown bear hunting seasons in Unit 9

Lengthening bear hunting seasons puts too much pressure on bears, which take years to recover because they reproduce so slowly. Bears are crucial for the ecosystem, and overhunting them could cause long-term harm.

Support with Amendment Proposal 10: Close Unit 9A to nonresident brown bear hunting

Closing Unit 9A to nonresident hunters is a good start, but stopping all brown bear hunting would be even better. Bears need protection to keep their population stable.

OPPOSE Proposal 11: Shorten spring and fall brown bear hunting seasons in Unit 9C

Shortening hunting seasons is a positive step, but hunting during critical times—like when bears are getting ready for hibernation—should be stopped entirely to protect cubs and the overall population.

OPPOSE Proposal 12: Lengthen fall brown bear hunting seasons in Units 9D and 9E

Extending the hunting season would overburden bear populations, which can't recover quickly due to their slow reproduction rate. This proposal risks wiping out bears in these areas.

OPPOSE Proposal 13: Lengthen fall brown bear hunting seasons in Units 9D and 9E for residents and nonresidents

Lengthening hunting seasons for everyone would lead to even more overhunting and put bears at greater risk. This harms not only bears but the entire ecosystem they support.

OPPOSE Proposal 14: Lengthen fall brown bear hunting seasons in Units 9D and 9E for residents and nonresidents

This proposal repeats the problem of overhunting, which can devastate bear populations and destabilize the environment.

OPPOSE Proposal 15: Lengthen nonresident spring brown bear hunting season in Units 9D and 9E

Allowing more time for nonresidents to hunt bears adds extra pressure on populations that are already struggling. Tourists are more likely to visit to see live bears, not hunt them.

OPPOSE Proposal 16: Lengthen fall brown bear hunting seasons in Units 9D and 9E for residents and nonresidents

Expanding the fall hunting season would harm bear populations and hurt the ecosystems that depend on them, including other animals and even plants.

OPPOSE Proposal 17: Lengthen spring and fall brown bear hunting seasons in Unit 9E for residents and nonresidents

Lengthening both spring and fall seasons leaves bears no time to recover and puts cubs at risk. This could wipe out the population in the long term.

Support with Amendment Proposal 18: Shorten spring and fall brown bear hunting seasons in Unit 9C and convert to drawing permits

Shortening hunting seasons and requiring permits is a small improvement, but stopping bear hunting entirely would be much better for their survival and the ecosystem.

Support with Amendment Proposals 19–20: Hunting Arctic fox on the Pribilof Islands

Arctic foxes are key to controlling small animal populations. Overhunting them could lead to a boom in rodents, which would upset the balance of the ecosystem and cause more problems for other animals.

OPPOSE Proposal 21: Remove the two-per-day bag limit for beavers

Beavers create wetlands that many animals rely on, including bears. Overhunting them would destroy habitats and harm the entire ecosystem.

OPPOSE Proposals 22, 35–36: Shorten wolverine hunting and trapping seasons

Protecting wolverines is important because they help clean up the environment. If wolverines are overhunted, it would hurt the whole ecosystem and make life harder for animals like bears.

OPPOSE Proposal 23: Lengthen hunting season for Emperor geese

Emperor geese are an important part of coastal ecosystems. Overhunting them would harm scavengers and predators, including bears, that rely on these areas for food.

OPPOSE Proposal 24: Close the season for Alaska hares

Alaska hares are food for many predators. Protecting them helps keep the food web balanced and ensures survival for animals like bears and wolves.

OPPOSE Proposals 25–27: Various changes to moose hunting in Unit 17A

Hunting too many moose takes away a food source for predators like bears, which could force them into more conflicts with humans.

Support with Amendment Proposal 29 Caribou hunting laws need to be modified for the protection of the species. Population numbers have crashed in all but 2 areas. We suggest NO hunting for at least the next 5 years until numbers rebound, and certainly no hunting allowed for non-residents.

OPPOSE Proposals 28, 30, 31: Caribou hunting restrictions in Units 9, 17, and 19

Limiting caribou hunting helps keep their populations stable, which also supports predators like bears and wolves.

OPPOSE Proposal 32: Allow year-round hunting of brown bears

This is one of the worst ideas. Bears can only reproduce every 4 to 6 years, so year-round hunting would quickly wipe them out and destroy the ecosystem.

OPPOSE Proposals 33–34: Allow airborne hunting of bears and wolves

Hunting animals from airplanes is unfair and unethical. It disrupts wildlife and could lead to population crashes that harm the whole environment.

OPPOSE Proposals 37–38: Changes to beaver hunting and sanctuary access

Allowing hunting in sanctuaries defeats their purpose and could destroy important habitats that support many species, including bears. Sanctuaries should be safe spaces for animals.

OPPOSE Proposals 39–45: Various changes to moose hunting in Unit 13

Hunting too many moose removes a key food source for bears and other predators, leading to ecosystem imbalance and possible conflicts with humans.

OPPOSE Proposals 46–50: Hunting caribou and sheep in Units 11 and 13

Caribou and sheep are critical prey for predators. Overhunting them forces bears and wolves to look elsewhere for food, upsetting nature's balance.

OPPOSE Proposals 51–56: Hunting sheep and goats

Hunting sheep and goats takes away food that predators like bears and wolves depend on. Letting these animals live naturally keeps the ecosystem balanced.

OPPOSE Proposal 57: Increase the bag limit for brown bears

Letting hunters kill more bears is a terrible idea. Bears already reproduce slowly, so overhunting could cause their numbers to crash and harm the entire ecosystem.

OPPOSE Proposals 58–59: Changes to wolf population management

Wolves keep small animal populations under control. Without them, rodents and other small mammals could overrun the area, causing even more problems.

OPPOSE Proposals 60–63: Changes to ptarmigan hunting

Ptarmigan are food for many predators, including bears. Overhunting them would disrupt the food web and make survival harder for larger animals.

OPPOSE Proposals 64, 66, 67

Increasing moose hunting at the current levels is bad enough, introducing NEW hunting seasons and handing out more permits will only make the situation worse.

Support with Amendment 65, 68, 69

If you are going to persist in allowing people to hunt moose, then yes, decrease the number of permits, lower the bag limit, and shorten the season. Frankly, for both caribou and moose, if anyone should be allowed to hunt them at all, it should be only the indigenous local population, who will use any animal killed as a major food source for themselves and their families. Trophy hunting is a disgraceful waste of a very limited natural resource, one which can save lives in the harsh Arctic.

OPPOSE Proposals 70 to 81, 83, 84: Expanding hunting and trapping seasons

Expanding hunting and trapping seasons puts too much pressure on wildlife and takes away resources from predators like bears. This harms the balance of the ecosystem and makes it harder for all animals to survive.

Support with Amendment 82: There should be NO traps anywhere where children, dogs, or ordinary citizens would be walking. Remove, or increase the distance from the sides of the roads/rights of way.

In Conclusion:

Almost all of these proposals harm wildlife and Alaska's environment. Protecting animals and promoting eco-tourism is better for the state's economy and ensures a future where Alaska's wildlife can thrive.

Intensive predator control programs damage ecosystem health and resilience. Also, bears and wolves have a cultural significance to indigenous people and their customs on prey harvesting should be considered.

Ecological significance: Large predators prevent overgrazing, and promote biodiversity, A study of wolves and moose in Isle Royale found that with fewer predators, moose become overcrowded, deplete their resources, and ultimately major die-offs. Bringing in more wolves led to a more sustainable population. Other studies have found more diverse plant life when predators and prey are in balance.

There seems to be insufficient data on whether this predator reduction would lead to a stable population or if it would lead to unsustainable growth and a collapse. I feel most hunters would prefer a more stable population.

Quality of the habitat: I question if there has been sufficient study on whether the habitat quality is enough to sustain an increased population. Also, more studies are needed on how often caribou is a part of the bear and wolf diet.

Potential for overcorrecting: Bears recover slowly due to their slow reproduction rate and are difficult to census. There is the potential to overcorrect leading to an unsustainable ecosystem.

I urge you to reconsider the predator control policies and invest in studies on caribou population health and habitat quality as well as more studies on predator-prey relationships. Protecting habitat quality and human activities that may affect habitat quality may be more sustainable in the long term.

Large carnivore management in Alaska is a reversion to outdated management concepts and occurs without effective monitoring programs designed to scientifically evaluate impacts on predator populations, or identify causal relationships between predator control and prey population dynamics. Large carnivore management in Alaska should be based on rigorous science including the status and trends of carnivore populations - this program does not meet those standards. Read more in the 2019 article, *Large carnivores under assault in Alaska*, which was authored by three Alaska state and federal wildlife biologists.

The proposed aerial gunning program borders some of the most iconic wildlife viewing areas in the world. Predator control is not popular with the general public. The State's reputation as a responsible wildlife manager is rightfully beginning to sour after aerially gunning down nearly 200 bears in southwestern Alaska. Authorizing this program on such loose and un-studied biological grounds bruises Alaska's image and erodes public faith in the Board of Game to make sustainable decisions.

By ADFG's own admission: "Adoption of this proposal would result in significant costs to the department if department staff conduct control activities" (ADFG comments on Prop 75, Page 224). The Intensive Management program against bears and wolves a few hundred miles west cost \$231,000 in 2022 and \$612,000 in 2023 (page 14, 2024 annual report to Board of Game) Predator control as a whole has accounted for ~\$2.5 million in lost federal funding, as Pitman Roberts funds cannot be used for Intensive management. At a time when ADFG has almost no funding for non-game programs and the State is struggling for cash, it is unwise to dedicate another quarter million dollars each year to predator control programs that have yet to be deemed effective.

If approved, this proposal would give ADFG full reign to implement an aerial gunning plan in Unit 16. Once a proposal like this is approved, ADFG has the authority to develop an Operational Plan for aerial gunning that is not open to public comment. This is the time to weigh in.

AWA's Position Paper on Predator Control and Intensive Management clearly lays out our position on these programs, as well as our recommendations.

Methodology Concerns:

The Black Bear Management Report estimates the bear population to be between 1,825 and 3,600 individuals. Such a wide variance indicates that the data collection methods are highly imprecise. Setting a harvest rate of 700 bears based on this range seems arbitrary and unscientific. This level of uncertainty suggests that the underlying data on bears—and potentially on wolves as well—may not be reliable.

Additionally, the report attributes moose die-offs primarily to high snow years. In years with significant moose population declines, it stands to reason that bear populations might naturally decrease as well, given the reduction in available prey. Harvesting 700 bears in such a scenario would only exacerbate the pressure on bear populations unnecessarily.

Terminology and Rationale:

This raises the question: why are moose populations prioritized over predators? The Moose Harvest Report cites "subsistence" as the justification. However, let's take a closer look at the reality. For example, there were only five hunters from Tyonek who could reasonably claim subsistence use. The overwhelming majority of hunters are from Anchorage and the Valley. The report also acknowledges that moose hunting in these areas requires access by boat or plane. Have you priced a Cessna 185, a Supercub, or even a boat? What about the cost of meat processing if the hunter doesn't do it themselves?

This isn't subsistence—this is sport hunting. Let's be honest: you can buy meat cheaper at Costco. While I fully support hunting as a 4th-generation Alaskan, prioritizing one species over another, especially when populations fluctuate naturally, is shortsighted. Moose populations have always experienced natural ebbs and flows; let that process continue without unnecessary interference.

We are also aware that AF&G has implemented plans to minimize cow hunting, and focus instead on the males. This makes sense. But, the issue here is, that due to changing weather patterns (which has affected the lichen) the herds are migrating between one and two months later than normal. Which means the males are in the rutting stage and that makes the meat inedible.

This proposal is flawed on many levels, but rather than using aerial gunning, consider these alternatives.

- work with conservationists/biologists on a plan to relocate the wolf packs. We know you've identified them, we know the biologists will know what areas they can be relocated to, and we know conservationists will come together to help the relocation, physically and financially.
- based on your own data, bears, being omnivores, aren't the main predator of ungulates. But both bears and wolves prey on small mammals that consume vegetation. Vegetation that is needed to sustain ungulate populations.
- lastly, and your own biologists have probably noted this, it's highly likely that many cows aren't gaining enough weight in summer to sustain a pregnancy through winter. Or, they're giving birth to already weakened calves. This is a climate/vegetation issue.

Your proposal is contemplating removing a natural and necessary part of the ecosystem. Regardless of how many predators you remove, the ungulate population (almost always cyclical in numbers), will keep diminishing. Address the root cause, literally, not the predators who are limiting the number of diseased ungulates in the population.

I appreciate you reading. Again, we want to make sure subsistence hunters have the food they need, so let's work together on a plan that doesn't involve unnecessary killing.

A 2022 article by ADFG and University of Alaska Fairbanks biologists published in the scientific journal Diversity, found no increase in moose harvests in the years following nearly 40 years of predator control in Southcentral Alaska.

Large carnivore management in Alaska is a reversion to outdated management concepts and occurs without effective monitoring programs designed to scientifically evaluate impacts on predator populations, or identify causal relationships between predator control and prey population dynamics. Large carnivore management in Alaska should be based on rigorous science including the status and trends of carnivore populations - this program does not meet those standards.

The proposed aerial gunning program borders some of the most iconic wildlife viewing areas in the world. Predator control is not popular with the general public. The State's reputation as a responsible wildlife manager is rightfully beginning to sour after aurally gunning down nearly 200 bears in southwestern Alaska. Authorizing this program on such loose and un-studied biological grounds bruises Alaska's image and erodes public faith in the Board of Game to make sustainable decisions.

Predator control as a whole has accounted for ~\$2.5 million in lost federal funding, as Pitman Roberts funds cannot be used for Intensive management. At a time when ADFG has almost no funding for non-game programs and the State is struggling for cash, it is unwise to dedicate another quarter million dollars each year to predator control programs that have yet to be deemed effective.

In Alaska's delicate northern ecosystems, this natural predator-prey relationship has evolved over millennia and helps maintain the health of both caribou and moose populations by selecting for stronger animals and preventing overgrazing of sensitive vegetation.

2. Questionable Scientific Basis

The proposal appears to prioritize short-term game management goals over long-term ecosystem stability. Predator control programs often fail to achieve their intended results and can lead to unintended consequences. Research has shown that wolf removal can disrupt pack structures and hunting patterns, potentially leading to more erratic predation patterns and decreased pack stability. Additionally, artificially inflating ungulate populations through predator control can lead to habitat degradation and increased vulnerability to disease.

3. Economic Impact on Tourism

Alaska's wolves are a vital draw for ecotourism, bringing significant revenue to local communities. Wolf watching and wildlife photography tours contribute substantially to Alaska's economy. The opportunity to view wolves in their natural habitat attracts visitors from around the world. Reducing wolf populations could negatively impact this sustainable source of income and Alaska's reputation as a premier wildlife viewing destination.

4. Alternative Solutions

Instead of lethal control, I urge the Department to consider alternative methods:

- Conducting more comprehensive studies of predator-prey dynamics in the target areas
- Implementing habitat improvement projects that benefit both predator and prey species
- Developing science-based wildlife viewing programs that generate economic benefits for local communities
- Establishing more protected areas where natural predator-prey relationships can function undisturbed

5. Public Trust Considerations

As a public agency, ADF&G has a responsibility to manage wildlife for all Alaskans, not just hunting interests. Wolves are a public trust resource that should be managed based on the best available science and for the benefit of the entire ecosystem. The proposed control program appears to favor single-species management over ecosystem-based approaches, which contradicts modern wildlife management principles.

I respectfully request that the Department withdraw this proposal and instead work with wildlife biologists, conservation organizations, and other stakeholders to develop a more balanced approach to wildlife management that preserves ecosystem integrity and natural predator-prey relationships.
